**DR. LOVERIDGE
TENDERS HIS
RESIGNATION**

From Active Work in the
Ministry Within a Short Time
or as Soon as His Successor as
Rector of St. Mary's Episcopal
Church is Chosen

Rev. D. E. Loveridge, who has been rector of St. Mary's Episcopal church of this city for the past eighteen years, has handed in his resignation, to take effect as soon as his successor is chosen. Bishop Scadding will be here about the 19th of May, at which time the name of the minister to succeed Dr. Loveridge will probably be announced. The reason for Dr. Loveridge's resignation is his advanced age, he having passed the 84th milestone in life's pathway. He feels that he is no longer able to perform the duties required of a growing parish, and has finally decided to give way to a younger man. He will not leave Eugene, however, and will make this city his permanent home. He will devote most of his attention to his fine orchard and vineyard, between Eugene and Springfield, and will supply the pulpits here in case of the absence of the regular minister whenever such occasion demands.

Dr. Loveridge will be greatly missed by the members of his congregation, but they, as well as the citizens of the city in general, are glad that he is not to leave Eugene.

**GREAT EARTHQUAKE IS
NOTED BY SEISMOGRAPH**

Washington early today, lasting over two hours.

City of Mexico, April 14.—An earthquake lasting four and a half minutes started this city tonight. The earth rocked in a long, swinging motion, terrifying the inhabitants but doing no damage so far as can be learned at this city. Clocks stopped at 11:34 p. m. (Mexican time) and the perceptible motion of the earth ceased at 11:38 1/2. The telegraph wires were put out of commission and for a short time the city was in darkness owing to the failure of the electric lights. The asphalt on one of the principal business streets of the city was cracked open for a distance of 10 yards. People fled from their homes into the streets.

Representatives of the Associated Press made rapid searches over the city, but nothing beyond cracked walls and small fissures could be found. At the police stations no deaths had been reported up to 12:40 a. m. A wall on Santiago street collapsed, killing a number of horses and wounding five men.

**EDITOR OF BULLETIN
WITHDRAWS CHARGES**

San Francisco, April 13.—Responding to a letter from Fremont Older, managing editor of the Bulletin, withdrawing the charges brought by him, the grand jury today voted a not true bill against John P. Barratt, the news editor of the Examiner. The investigation followed the alleged confession of Eddy Grancy, that at the cost of \$6000 Barratt hired him and James Coffroth to cause wholesale-buffet box stuffing in the primaries of 1904.

Mr. Older in his letter stated that he withdrew the charges because their pursuit at this time might hinder and hamper the Huef-Schmitz prosecutions. Asked whether today's action by the grand jury precludes that body from taking up the Barratt investigation at a later time, Heney replied:

"There is no law to that effect."

**STANDARD MAY
BE FINED MILLIONS
OF DOLLARS**

Chicago, April 13.—The Standard Oil Company was found guilty at 10 o'clock tonight of rebating, by a jury in Federal Judge Landis' court. The jury declared the trust was not guilty on 441 counts of the indictment, but that it was liable on 1462 counts. The maximum fine is \$20,000 on each count and the minimum \$1000. Therefore the maximum gross fines may aggregate \$29,240,000.

**NATIONAL PEACE CONGRESS
OPENS IN NEW YORK**

ty which we had with our friendly neighbor to the north of us we solved by agreement with a joint commission composed of representatives of the peoples interested. We try to avoid meddling in affairs that are not our concern, and yet we have our views heard where they will avail on behalf of fair dealing and against cruelty and oppression.

"We have concluded certain arbitration treaties. I only regret that we have not concluded a larger number. Our representatives will go to the second peace conference at The Hague instructed to help in every practicable way to bring some steps nearer completion the great work which the first conference began. It is idle to expect that a task so tremendous can be settled by one or two conferences. It is not possible that the conference should go more than a certain distance further in the right direction. Yet I believe that it can make real progress on the road toward international justice, peace and fair dealing.

"One of the questions, though not to my mind one of the most important, which will be brought before the conference will be that of the limitation of armaments. The United States, owing to its peculiar position, has a regular army so small as to be infinitesimal when compared to that of any first-class power. We are no longer enlarging our navy; we are simply keeping up its strength, very moderate indeed when compared with our wealth, population and coast line; for the addition of one battleship a year barely enables us to make good the units which become obsolete. The most practical step in diminishing the burden of expense caused by the increasing size of naval armaments would be, I believe, by an agreement limiting the size of all ships hereafter to be built; but hitherto it has not been possible to get other nations to agree with us on this point.

"More important that reducing the expense of the implements of war is the question of reducing the possible cause of war, which can more effectively be done by substituting other methods for the settlement of disputes. Of these other methods the most important which is now attainable is arbitration. I do not believe that in the world as it actually is, it is possible for any nation to agree to arbitrate all differences which may arise between itself and other nations, but I do believe there can be at this time a very large increase in the classes of cases which it is agreed shall be arbitrated and that provision can be made for greater facility and certainty of arbitration. I hope to see adopted a general arbitration treaty among the nations and I hope to see the Hague court greatly increased in power and permanency and the judges in particular made permanent and given adequate salaries so as to make it increasingly probable that in every case that may come before them they will decide between the nations, great or small, exactly as a judge within our own limits decides between individuals. Doubtless many other matters will be taken up at The Hague, but it seems to me that this matter of a general arbitration treaty is perhaps the most important."
