COUNCIL WOULD PURCHASE COMPANY'S WATER PLANT

Resolution to That Effect Adopted at Meeting Last Night

Mayor and Fire and Water Committee Empowered to Communicate With Willamette Valley Company and to Make Surveys for Location of Pure Water Supply for the City

The city council in committee of the whole, after the business session had adjourned last night, took up the matter of arranging for preliminary steps for a municipal water plant. An offer will be made the Willamette Valley Company to purchase the company's system, and the mayor and the committee on fire and water are authorized to arrange for preliminary surveys necessary for the purpose of ascertaining and locating a supply of pure water for the city. The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the council in committee of the whole:

"Resolved, That the mayor, together with the committee on fire and water be, and they are hereby authorized, to cause to be made such preliminary surveys as they shall deem necessary for the purpose of ascertaining and locating a water supply for the city of Eugene; and be it further

"Resolved, That the common council of the city of Eugene, being about to proceed with the work of securing for said city a municipal water plant, the mayor, together with the committee on fire and water, are hereby authorized and directed to communicate with the Willamette Valley Company, with a view to ascertaining if its water plant is for sale, and if so, at what price; and are hereby authorized to negotiate with said company in regard to the purchase of their said water plant and report the result of such negotiations back to the council as soon as possible."

Appointments Announced.

As predicted in the Guard a week ago Mayor Matlock reappointed Chief of Police Farrington at the meeting last night, together with the other members of the police force and the present street commissioner and his assistant. The appointments are as follows:

Chief of police—E. A. Farrington.
First night policeman—W. W. Purdy.
Second night policeman—Geo. F. Croner.
Street commissioner—Jas. P. Turner.
Assistant street commissioner—Albert Baker.
Policeman at Fairmount—J. O. Bristol.
Dog tax collector—L. Bonney.

The appointment of a city engineer has been postponed for some time, the present incumbent, Geo. A. Vaggoner, to serve until his successor is named.

Routine Business.
A petition from H. R. Kincaid, W. L. Kincaid, L. Rikel and Duncan Scott asking that the council allow them to use the breeding pen for stallions on their lot at the south end of Charnellton street was presented. A remonstrance signed by a number of residents of the neighborhood was read. By motion the petition was rejected.

Yates' barn, Warnock Bros' barn and Barnard & West's barn were by resolution designated as the places where stallions may be kept.

The matter of street sprinkling was taken up and by motion referred to the street committee with instructions to secure contracts for sprinkling street intersections and streets opposite the city hall and library as soon as possible.

Street Improvements.
The chairman of the street committee, to which was referred the grading and graveling of an alley between West Third and West Fourth streets from Jefferson to Madison, and on Cheshire street, reported favorably and the report was adopted.

A petition for grading Moss avenue from East Thirteenth street to Fairmount boulevard, and afterward changed to East Fifteenth street, was presented and referred to the street committee.

Petition for grading and graveling East Fifteenth street in Fairmount was also read and referred.

Mumme Bros. were allowed \$100, the balance due them on the East Eleventh street sewer.

A bill of \$108.25 was presented for work on the parks and allowed.

The petition for lights in Fair-

mount which was referred to the fire and water committee at a previous meeting, was filed with others of the same character until a readjustment of the lights is made.

The recorder was ordered to re-advertise for bids for grading Summit avenue.

An ordinance establishing the grade on Cheshire street between Washington and Jefferson, was passed.

The health committee was authorized to go ahead and put in the flush tanks for sewers.

Henderson President.

Councilman R. B. Henderson, of the Second ward, who has been president of the council during the past year, was re-elected to that position.

The council will meet again Monday evening, April 22.
