STREET SPRINKLING

There is voiced by the Merchants' Protective Association considerable dissatisfaction with the street sprinkling methods in this city. This is a work that is hard to do in a way that is satisfactory to all, but was done last year about as well as could be expected under the present arrangement.

What Eugene must make up her mind to do is to get away from the village ideas and methods of government, and take a step in advance in municipal government, or discontent and trouble will be the rule and not the exception. We are rapidly growing into a city and this fact must be appreciated and methods changed to correspond.

Sprinkling should no longer be done by voluntary assessments along the streets covered, where some property owners refuse to pay and others are taxed double what they should be, but it should be placed upon the same footing as other improvement work. The city council should determine the streets to be sprinkled, and the number of times daily it is to be done, publish notice to this effect, and set a time for hearing objections the same as in other municipal work. After this is done the boundaries of the sprinkling district should be fixed, and an assessment levied upon the property according to its frontage, the contract, in the meantime, having been let to the lowest responsible bidder, the city or the contractor to furnish the sprinkling carts, as the case may be.

This is the way the work is done in the cities, and there is no other way to get it done right. The expense then falls upon the property owner, who must fix his rent and estimate his income with the full understanding that he has such burdens to bear. It is just and equitable because all must pay in proportion to the amount of property effected, and none can shirk his just proportion and throw a double burden upon a more progressive citizen.

There is a young Virginia candidate for the nomination to fill a congressional vacancy who is foxy enough to be a high financier. He closed an address to a meeting in a horse neighborhood by asking his hearers to "give one of the colts a chance to jump the hurdles."

MRS. ADDITON SPEAKS TO HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

Mrs. Additon, president of the Oregon W. C. T. U., gave a short address to the high school students yesterday afternoon on the use of intoxicating liquors and tobacco.

Mrs. Additon was a newspaper woman at one time, and yesterday afternoon offered a prize for the best report of her lecture. She spoke along practical and scientific lines. After giving a brief history of the scientific investigations and experiments she showed the effects of alcohol on the physical constitution. She then gave a few simple experiments with alcohol and alcoholic preparations.
