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JUDGE FRAZER SPEAKS ABOUT JUVENILE COURT

Addressed the Students and Faculty
of the University at Assembly
This Forenoon - Speaks of Crimi-
nals and Prisons--Most Boys
Who Commit Crimes Are Mem-
bers of Street Gangs.

Judge Arthur L. Frazer, class of '82, delivered a fine address at the university this morning on "The Juvenile Court and Its Work." He said in part:

"What interested me most when I went on to the bench nine years ago was the criminals who came before the court. I noticed that most of the criminals who are sentenced are from the age of sixteen to twenty-two years. At first I thought this was a mere coincidence, but I inquired of other judges and found that they had noted the same thing. I then looked into the records and discovered that the average age of the inmates of the penitentiary is twenty-four. I have been told that the average age of the criminal in the Oregon penitentiary is twenty-eight.

"Now there is another fact that I want to point out in addition: The older criminals are rarely reformed, and it is when young that a criminal must be reformed.

"Most of the boys who commit crimes are in the first place members of street gangs, and are known as bad boys. Then, too, there is another thing to consider in the things which make criminals--the jails and prisons of our state. When a boy is sent to prison he learns not to fear it, but sometimes looks upon it as a refuge. When he is sent to prison his pride is broken, and he does not care to associate with his old companions who would look down upon him. So he is forced to associate with the vile and evil. Sometimes old offenders will commit a crime just to get back to jail, where he can get good food, so low is he fallen.

"It is these things that created the juvenile court, first in Chicago in 1898-9, and in Denver a little later. The methods of our court are entirely different from other courts. We do not have any juries or any lawyers, though the children have a right to them, but we do not try them to correct them, but simply to find out the truth, and then cover up the incident and give the child a new chance. We usually let the children go along without anything more being done when they have good homes, but if we do not we have them report so often and have a probation officer go around to see how he is getting along. Other boys, who have either no homes or bad ones, are sent to the detention home, where they are kept until something better can be done for them or more found out.

"Now, out of these children what per cent come out all right? Our records show that ninety-five per cent of them have no more trouble.

Without our court there would be I think, from past records, between five or six hundred children in the police courts each year, most of whom would be thrown in jail.

"There is another problem, however, which is much more serious: The girl problem. I have brought before me every week three or four girls, whose trials is held by me and the girl's mother only. Sometimes we do not even put the case on record. Many mothers do not realize how important it is to keep their daughters off the streets or out of skating rinks and public ball rooms. Many of them think that they did not have a good time themselves when young and intend that Jennie shall have one now. This problem is greater than hardly any of you realize, and you, young woman, when you see this, tell the mother of the danger.

"Because the juvenile court is remedying these things, more than any other agency, it is saving the state of Oregon and the different counties, for it affects the whole state in the work, thousands of dollars, but most of all the lives and bodies of hundreds of youth who would without the juvenile work become criminals."

AGENTS MUST PAY IF LINE IS FINED

Men Responsible for Train Bulletins
To Shoulder the Blame, Says
Superintendent O'Brien.

If, through the negligence of agents along the O. R. & N., or Southern Pacific, the Harriman system or its officials are fined for failure to display proper bulletins showing the arrival of a delayed train, the amount must be provided by the agent responsible.

This is the ultimatum which has gone forth from the office of General Manager J. P. O'Brien. The officials of the system state it was their belief bulletins were being posted at the larger stations, and it was not until the matter was brought to their attention by the Oregon railroad commission that the truth was known. After a conference with the commissioners it was brought out the railroads offered no objection to posting bulletins, and even at that time new boards were being turned out for some stations.

One complaint cited the fact that a bulletin had been posted on a board at Umatilla three days, not having been changed. When officials of the system start from Portland on an inspection trip the fact is immediately made known along the line, and by the time they reach the principal stations any lack of discipline is erased. For that reason it has been easier for the public to discover errors than the head of the line. It is not true that bulletins have not been correctly attended to at all stations, but as there were failures in some instances it has been determined to have the service uniform. Portland Telegram.

MRS. JAMES AGAIN IN TOILS OF THE LAW

Woman Accused of Theft of John
Tunnel's \$240 Check Arrested
Once More and Will Be Given
Another Examination Before
Justice of the Peace Bryson in
Eugene.

An information was filed today against Mrs. Annie James, charging her with larceny, in that she is alleged to have been connected with the theft of the \$240 check from John Tunnel, the Creswell miller. She was arrested once before on the same charge, but upon examination before Justice of the Peace Bryson was discharged from custody, as the evidence introduced did not seem strong enough to warrant holding her for trial in the circuit court. Additional evidence against the woman has since been found and she will be tried on the charge. Bert Kelsay, the young man who gave himself up to the sheriff Monday, is charged with the same crime. The case has already attracted a good deal of attention and promises to attract much more before it is completed. A large number of witnesses have been subpoenaed to appear at the examination of Kelsay next Monday and at the trial of Mrs. James.

Mrs. James was taken into custody at Springfield this forenoon by Constable Plank of this city and brought to Eugene. She at once employed Lee M. Travis to defend her and appeared before Justice of the Peace Bryson this afternoon for arraignment.
