OPEN THE RIVER.

The commercial bodies of Eugene should not lose sight of the fact that there is one practical way to get relief from the high freight tariffs; that is to open the Upper Willamette river to navigation.

This is an entirely feasible plan, and the work will be done by the federal government once the case is strongly presented by Oregon's delegation in congress. The benefits to be derived will be almost incalculable. A vast territory, embracing many thousands of square miles, rich in agricultural, timber and mineral resources, will feel the magic influence of intensified development once the unjust burdens imposed by the railroad are removed.

Those who have a thorough knowledge of the Willamette river assert that the cost of the proposed improvement will not be great and that the work may be quickly done, once it is begun in earnest. Steamers have already been brought to Eugene, and the clearing out of snags, dredging of a few bars, and perhaps a couple of inexpensive locks would be the extent of an improvement that would permit permanent, unrestricted navigation as far as this city.

"Open the river," should be the slogan of our commercial bodies. It should be dinged-donged into the ears of our senators and congressmen until they will use their untiring efforts to secure the needed assistance from the government.

THAW'S GOOD SENSE.

Harry Thaw is proving his sanity discharging a lot of lawyers who seem to have as little sense as it is possible to have and manage to keep out of a home for the feeble-minded. The defendant, if the newspapers are to be believed, opposed from the first the insanity plea. He evidently realized that it would be hard to make a jury believe him insane one moment and rational the next, and that the so-called expert testimony would count little in a jury's deliberation. The only hope for the defendant lies in an appeal to sympathy, based on the alleged wrong suffered by his wife, and after her story has been told on the witness stand no twelve men can ever agree upon a verdict of guilty. There may be disagreements, but in the end a verdict of acquittal, or the state will drop the proceedings, convinced of the impossibility of conviction. Thaw has undoubtedly reasoned this out, and feels that had not the defense testified so much with insanity testimony, he would have been acquitted on the first trial.

The move of the defense in securing the admission of Mrs. Thaw's testimony as tending to show the effect of her story upon her husband's mind, seems to have been the only clever move of the high-priced counsel, and the defendant knew when that point was gained the insanity plea had served its only good purpose. That was probably the reason he became disgusted and called Delmas down when he started in to go over again with all his insanity experts.

The reappointment of Hon. S. H. Friendly to be regent of the State University will meet with universal approval in this city. There is no more enterprising citizen or one who has proven himself more faithful in the discharge of a public trust, and this position carries with it honor and distinction. The members of the board are chosen from the list of those who rank highest in public life and private citizenship.

W. T. Stoad, the London editor, who has done more or less muck-raking, on both sides of the Atlantic, is now in this country preaching the doctrine of half-a-loaf-is-better-than-no-bread, in connection with the coming peace conference at The Hague. And it's a wise doctrine.

Senator Spooner knew where the money was. His first public appearance as a lawyer since being in the senate was in the U. S. Supreme court, as counsel for the Chicago corporations which are contesting the payment of about \$700,000 claimed by the city for taxes.

THE UNIVERSITY "PUSH"

(Baker City Daily Herald.)

And now Colonel Lister of the Capital Journal has taken up the cause of the few grangers who are attempting to defeat the university appropriation by referring to the "university push" and its "graft." The colonel is a great exponent of the dog in the manger doctrine; that of keeping others from having what has been denied him. But nevertheless the vilification of the state university officials will not avail for there are too many people in the state of Oregon, grangers, mechanics, professional men and merchants, who have won their sons and daughters fitted for the battle of the modern world in the state university and who realize what an institution of the kind means to the state at large, who will fight to the last ditch for the protection of the school.

Throughout his attack upon the state university Col. Lister resorts to deceit. He knows that should he present the matter to his readers fairly and impartially there would not be one of them who would not do anything within his power to aid the school. Knowing this, he resorts to the means of personal abuse, calling the professors "grafters" and stating that they could not earn the salary they receive from the state in any other way than by

ing on the faculty of the state university. By implication, he says that they are not worth the money they are getting. Upon what authority Col. Lister makes this statement is not shown and the fact that he has made like statements in reference to other matters in the past, which could not be substantiated, does not tend to lend the color of truth to these.

People of Baker county have their own ideas about the value of the state university. There are more graduates of Baker High School in the state university than from any other high school in the state, with the exceptions of Eugene and Portland, and the people here know what has been done for the local students there. In view of the fact that every one here knows that useful men and women have been made of the students sent there; that they have been educated properly and given the start needed by the young man or woman in this day and age, the only thing that remains for the people of this section to do is to get together and do what they can to stem the tide of opposition which is being agitated by a very, very few ignorant men and women who are jealous because their fathers did not provide an institution of learning like the state university for them to attend.

WOULD PREVENT SALE OF GREAT NORTHERN

To stop what is an alleged attempt on the part of former stockholders in the Great Northern Development Company to sell the stock to other parties, H. C. Mahon, of Eugene, yesterday filed suit for injunction to restrain the former stockholders from carrying out their alleged intentions. Upon the filing of the suit County Judge Stewart, in the absence of Judge Galloway, granted a temporary injunction.

W. B. Glass (trustee), W. W. Robe, J. H. Glass, W. A. Templeton, A. M. Templeton, R. L. Robe and the Great Northern Development are the parties named as the defendants in the suit.

According to the alleged facts, the defendants on January 30, 1907, contracted with one W. T. Shurtliff, said to hail from Sacramento, California, to sell the stock in the Great Northern mines, consisting of 250,570 shares, at the rate of five cents per share.

It is alleged that the stock was to be delivered to W. B. Glass, who was authorized to issue the stock to Shurtliff. Last Friday, according to the allegations, W. T. Shurtliff transferred the stock held by himself, to the plaintiff, H. C. Mahon. Percy R. Kelly and Morris & Skipworth are attorneys for the plaintiff.—Albany Herald.
