PORTLAND-SPOKANE HEARING

The jobbers of Portland, backed by the newspapers of that city, are attempting to bolster up the claims of the railroads that they have a right to discriminate in rates against the city of Spokane. Interstate Commerce Commissioner Prouty is asked to rule that it is right and lawful for the railroads to charge a freight tariff on shipments from the East to Spokane equal to the rate from Eastern points to Portland, with the local tariff from Portland back to Spokane added. In other words, that is worth nearly twice as much to ship goods from the East to Spokane as it is to coast points several hundred miles further away. Portland jobbers are selfishly asking for this unjust ruling because it is a case wherein discrimination benefits them by allowing them to control the wholesale trade of a large territory, that of right should be served by Spokane jobbers.

And this instance illustrates the utter impossibility to work out real reforms in the commercial or political world. The innate selfishness of humanity abnormally developed by the commercial tendencies of the times, steps in at a critical juncture and blocks every effort. Portland newspapers devote whole pages of space to denouncing the methods invoked by corporate greed—but become the staunch supporters of the same corporations when their unfair practices inure to the benefit of Portland business men who patronize their advertising columns. The reform they advocate is not the kind that begins at home.

This is the trouble with the country today, and so long as the selfish side of human nature is so much in evidence there will be plenty of work for magazine writers of the Lincoln Steffens' school to do. Graft, combination and discrimination will flourish like the proverbial green bay tree until men's minds are broadened and their greed for wealth at any price gives place to a willingness to apply the golden rule to the every day affairs of life.

HEALTH CONDITIONS GOOD

It is highly gratifying to be able to state that health conditions were never better in Eugene than they are at present. The report of the city health officer recently showed that the death rate for the past year had been unusually low, and that no epidemic of sickness of any character had prevailed during the past year. During the present month up to this time there has not been a single death in Eugene from any cause, according to the report of the local undertakers. For a city of 7500 people this is a remarkable showing.
