PRELIMINARY ACTION FOR CHURCH UNION

United Brethren and Congregational Churches of Eugene Take Steps Looking to Consolidation - Definite Union Cannot Take Place for Perhaps Two Years

A committee each from the United Brethren and Congregational churches of this city will meet in the office of A. E. Wheeler this evening for the purpose of arranging for the preliminary steps looking to the union of the two churches. The United Brethren committee consists of the pastor, Rev. Geo. E. McDonald, H. W. Hall, J. M. Kison, and Mrs. M. E. Livermore, and the committee from the Congregational church is A. E. Wheeler, Miss Emma Wold and Professor Jos. Schafer.

Actual union cannot take place at once, but arrangements will be made for interchange of pulpits and a closer relationship until such time as a full union can be consummated. For some time past the Congregationalists, the United Brethren and the Protestant Methodists have been talking of consolidation with bright prospects of their hopes being realized. It will be a matter of a year or perhaps two years, however, before this can be accomplished, as the general bodies of these churches will have to enter into an agreement and the agreement submitted to each for action. In the meantime the two local churches to be embraced in the proposed union will be practically one, and it is probable that Rev. Geo. E. McDonald, pastor of the U. B. church, will fill the pulpit at the Congregational church, at least for a time, and both congregations will meet together. Mr. McDonald expects to leave in the fall for the East to attend a theological seminary, and his successor will be chosen by the two organizations.

SPIRITS TELL WOMAN WHERE TO FIND GOLD

BAKER CITY, Or., April 18.—Spirits having told her where a rich deposit of gold lies in the Virtue district, Mrs. Charles Mitchell, wife of a local restaurateur, feels aggrieved because John Traut and R. H. Taylor, owners of the property on which the gold is located, will not allow her to dig it up. Charging that the mining men struck her with a strap, at the same time being armed, Mrs. Mitchell had them arrested. They were given a preliminary hearing in the justice court this morning and bound over to the circuit court.

Mrs. Mitchell's story was told in court. She said as soon as the spirits told her of the rich gold mine she took her husband to the spot and bade him dig. While he was tearing ing large holes in the earth Taylor and Traut appeared upon the scene and warned him that he was trespassing. Mrs. Mitchell took a hand and informed the mining men she would rather die than leave the claim. Taylor and Traut compelled the Mitchell to leave the claim and do not deny they were armed at the time. They deny striking Mrs. Mitchell, however, and claim they had the right to carry firearms in dealing with trespassers.

S. P. CO. MAY BUILD FOURTH MILL ON MOHAWK

A citizen of the Mohawk valley in town today informed the Guard that it is generally reported the Southern Pacific company will erect another sawmill in the valley, to be located about a mile and a half south of Donna, a station on the Wendling ranch. The company has a very large tract of timber land in that locality and as it is too far to be reached by the loggers for the other three mills operated by the company in the vicinity of Marcola, it is thought that a fourth mill will be erected within a short time there.

The Mohawk is now the busiest sawmill district in this part of the state and prospects are that it will be still busier this summer, as all the mills will be working on full time and others besides the proposed fourth mill for the S. P. Co. may be erected in the valley.

LA FOLLETTE WOULDN'T EAT WITH LEVI ANKENY

Wisconsin Senator Declined Proffered Hospitality of Washington Senator at Walla Walla.

When Senator Robert M. La Follette, of Wisconsin, reached Walla Walla yesterday after lecturing at Pendleton on Monday night, he was invited by Senator Levi Ankeny to dine at the Ankeny home in the Garden City. However, the invitation was most politely declined on the ground that Senator LaFollette was ill and could not accept the hospitality of the Ankeny home, nor a proffered trolley ride to Milton on the new electric line.

Since Senator Ankeny voted against all of the La Follette amendments to the railroad rate bill and his name appears on the wrong side of the roll call, it is thought that Senator LaFollette gracefully declined the invitation of Senator Ankeny rather than accept his hospitality and then be compelled to class his host with the railroad corruptionists in his lecture.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

EDNA GOODRICH

Some Things About Nat C. Goodwin's Leading Actress.

Miss Edna Goodrich, Nat C. Goodwin's leading actress, is a Hoosier girl, having been born in Logansport, Ind. She was educated in Chicago, where her father was a prominent coffee merchant. She made her first appearance on the stage at the Casino, New York, in "Florodora." She was one of the sextette, but not of the famous originals. When the "Florodora" fever was over Miss Goodrich went with Anna Held and played Madame Recamier in "Mlle. Napoleon." Then she decided to become an actress. She placed herself in the hands of a former prominent actress now retired, and studied night and day for nearly a year. When she had confidence in her ability to act she purchased the rights of the comedy, "The Genius and the Model," from the de Mille brothers, and starred in the piece several weeks jointly with Harry Woodruff. The tour was not successful, Mr. Goodwin purchased the comedy and reduced the title to "The Genius," and engaged Miss Goodrich to play the leading role. She scored a signal success in this play, and also as Margaret in "A Gilded Fool." Miss Goodrich is considered one of the most beautiful women in America. She is only 22 years of age. Her mother is her traveling companion.

AL MONTGOMERY MAKES GOATS PAY

Al Montgomery is building one of the finest goat barns in the county on his ranch at Vida. It will be 42x60 feet in size and will be arranged with every modern convenience. At present he has less than a hundred goats, but he has found them so profitable that he will increase his band.

Mr. Montgomery states that from his 87 goats he cleared in eighteen months \$500, and during that time scarcely paid any attention to them. As to increase he says that fourteen nannies raised 25 good, healthy kids, which seems to be pressing the record very closely.
