THE GUARD IS GROWING

The Guard has received and placed in position another job press, and with the same consignment of freight received a new stitching machine, and second new series of job type. With these additions this office claims the most complete job plant in a field of similar size in the West, and feels that it has every facility at hand for printing a newspaper and handling a complete job printing and publishing business.

During the past year the Guard has purchased a latest model Mergenthaler Linotype, which cost us installed \$4000, a 7-column quarto two-revolution Cranston news press, two new job presses, an Eclipse folder, stitching machine, and hundreds of dollars' worth of new type and material required to fit up a modern plant, the entire cost being not less than \$10,000.

While the outlay has been heavy, the increase of business in all lines has already justified it, and the satisfaction of having a complete plant and being prepared to do all kinds of work in a first-class manner, is worth something of itself. More than that, we have faith in the future of Eugene and Lane county, and believe this is destined to be a city several times its present size before many more years pass. Newspapers make a point of keeping fully abreast of the procession at all times and the Guard is determined that it will be no exception to the rule. It is hardly necessary to maintain the improvements made in the Daily Guard in the past twelve months because they are apparent to all our readers; we simply refer to them as evidence that we are working earnestly to make a newspaper in this city that will be worthy of the patronage of all classes, and that will be improved and enlarged as fast as increasing business justifies it; a paper that has for its platform: Advocacy of those measures only that make for the greatest good to the greatest number; unswerving loyalty to the interests of Lane county and its beautiful capital city.

The bottom seems to have dropped out of the hop market entirely, and several of our citizens who have their last year's crop still on hand are beginning to wonder whether or not it really pays to raise hops. Our people have not been given a chance to sell when the price was up where they would be justified in turning off their crop, but when the price falls they have a chance to sell at a few cents under the market. There are a number of lots of hops in storage here, and the owners have about made up their minds to hold them until they can realize enough for them to make them even on the harvesting of the crop. We are of the opinion that it would be a good plan for the hop growers of this section to form an association and pool their hops, and then there would be enough of them to attract the attention of some of the larger dealers, and in this manner it is likely that higher prices could be obtained. As the matter now stands this section of the country has been turned over to the small dealers and they simply buy when they have an order for a car or so, and in this manner our people do not get what their product is really worth. It would be a pretty good plan to combine a little, at least, and in this manner all would be benefited—at least that is our opinion.—Bulletin.
