TIME TO GET BUSY.

Settled spring weather seems to have come at last and there should be no delay in beginning work on the electric line and street paving. We want these improvements early in the year in order to get the full benefit from them during 1907. They will awaken new life and encourage those who are contemplating improvements to go ahead; more than this, they will attract the incoming home-seekers and investors who always come in the fall.

The Commercial Club should get busy before the hot season calls its members to the seashore and mountains and put in some good looks for Eugene. The Willamette Valley Co. and Warren Construction Co. should be asked to hurry along just a little, and the S. P. Co. should be interviewed regarding that perennial promise to build a new depot. Then there is the government building that the Oregon delegation might remind the treasury department about "lest they forget."

Throw off the spring fever lassitude and get busy!

Nineteen hundred and six was the greatest year for invention on record. The greatest activity was in improvements and discoveries in electrical apparatus, machinery for automobiles, gas engines, and wireless telegraphy. It is not possible for the patent department to give the exact number of patents granted, but it is announced that all records were broken, and that the commercial value of last year's patents exceeds any previous year. Edward B. Moore, assistant commissioner of patents, is authority for the statement that the applications for patents today come almost entirely from professional inventors, men who are trained to discover and devise new methods, new processes, new machines and improvements on old machinery. They are paid very large salaries by corporations because of their inventive genius. The long-haired crank is seen no more about the patent office department. The inventor of today is a scientist. Their inventions are not the result of accidents, but are obtained after years of careful study, the application of scientific knowledge, combined with plenty of experience.

It keeps the Butte papers, since their resumption of publication, hustling to accommodate both advertisers and readers says the LaGrande Observer. Advertisers, realizing what they lost because of inability to reach patrons during the suspension of the papers, are demanding all the available space of those papers and good reading matter is being crowded out. Those merchants were forcibly made to realize that readers of papers are purchasers of goods. When the papers again resumed publication these merchants did not attempt to sit down and figure out which readers they wanted for customers—what they wanted was customers, and they didn't care which paper they read. But in order to reach them all they need all of the papers and are thus getting a share of all the custom. Some merchants think that the readers of some of the papers are not worth the courteous request for patronage or fair information of their bargains; such merchants are not capable of learning the lesson that all Butte merchants learned. The merchant who has a bargain for you tells you about it in the papers you read.

Talk About Springfield not being on the map. Just take the trouble to look at the Southern Pacific timetable and you will find Springfield printed in large black gothic letters, and our sister town, Eugene, printed in small, the smallest type made—Springfield News.

This is merely evidence of what the

Guard has been contending for some time past—that the Southern Pacific Company is discriminating against Eugene, one of its principal shipping points, in every possible way. And yet the corporation has the nerve to send its traveling freight and passenger agents to our businessmen asking them to favor the Harriman roads in routing the shipments.

The books were taken to the library building yesterday and are being daily installed in their proper places. This is quite an addition to the list of books already on hand, and the gift is highly appreciated by the library board and the patrons of the institution. The board will prepare a proper resolution of thanks and forward it to Miss Whiteaker.

The books donated by Miss Whiteaker include a full set of the reports of the 46th congress, reports of the Smithsonian Institute, reports of Arctic explorations and many other valuable works. Thinking that they would be useful to the students of the university and high school in preparing their debates and orations, Miss Whiteaker concluded that she could not put the books to better use than to donate them to the library.
