COTTON HIRED LAWYERS TO TALK ON STREETS

Portland, Or., April 18.—The closing day of the Portland hearing of the Spokane rate case was characterized by a determined assault of the railroad attorneys on Gillette, the Spokane man who was introduced as an expert on railroad construction. The case was concluded at 1 o'clock and it was decided that the arguments would be heard at Washington the last week in June.

One of the day's witnesses was W. W. Cotton, who was put on the stand by the Great Northern attorneys to prove the market value of terminal property at Spokane, in rebuttal of

testimony given by Spokane real estate men yesterday.

Fought Terminal Price.
Regarding a piece of property which Merriwether of Spokane testified was worth only \$3000, Mr. Cotton said that when the O. R. & N. Co. wanted to get a strip 17 feet wide for right of way, damages were assessed in the sum of \$150,000 against the company. The case was tried in court from 1888 to 1890. One jury reduced the value to \$90,000, and the company secured a new trial and finally got the figures reduced to \$25,000. Adding costs and interest, the strip cost the company \$26,000. It was 17 feet of ground that had been supposed to be a street running along

the piece of ground which Merriwether valued at \$3000 for real estate purposes. "Were not those boom times in Spokane?" asked Attorney Stevens, of that city?

Scheme to Swing Sentiment.
"It seemed to be. It was a time when the Great Northern was about to come into Spokane," Mr. Cotton replied. "I remember that I hired a couple of distinguished lawyers to stand on the street and cackle about the inadvisability of keeping railroads out of a city. Mr. Hill afterward started to pass north of the city and Spokane then gave him a free right of way to bring him in."

The old league grounds at the south end of Willamette street will at once be improved and by the time the season fairly opens they will be in good condition. The varsity games will also be played there during the spring.

MRS WASHBURNE EXPLAINS CEMENT SIDEWALK INCIDENT

Editor Guard:—Just a word of explanation in regard to repairing sidewalks in the cement district. I have too keen an appreciation of good citizenship to oppose in the least ordinances that make for progress and improvement. Rather do I welcome gladly everything that adds to the beauty and development of our town. I began repairing my sidewalk in perfect good faith that I was within the province of the law, and deeming it much wiser to postpone building a cement walk until the permanent grade of the street was established, thus saving me the expense of rebuilding when the street car track is laid and a permanent grade is established. Also the width of the curbing is in dispute among the members of the council, some thinking sixteen feet too wide, others that it should be changed to a less width.

However, our Lord Chesterfield of a city marshal has told me that cement walks go down immediately, no matter what follows in the future in the way of grades, etc. And like the typical women of ages past I obey. Woman has always obeyed and been held amenable to laws in which she had no voice in the making. She seems to have sufficient acumen to get together money to pay the sheriff for taxes, yet does not have political sense enough to know how it ought to be spent. Taxation without representation in 1775 was tyranny; is it less tyrannous in 1907?

Women without representation pay taxes today on property of a far greater value than was included in all the thirteen original states. The justice of women having some voice in the disposition of the taxes they pay is self evident. Yet our magna charter will come. Although the laws of social evolution work slowly, in the end justice will prevail.

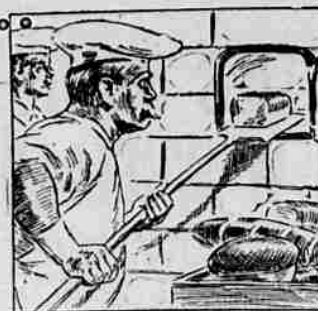
