CITY PARK COMMISSION ORGANIZES

F. M. Wilkins Chosen President and
W. W. Calkins Secretary - Will
Ask the Council for \$800 Addi-
tional to Complete the Work
Mapped Out For the Present Year

The first meeting of the new city park commission was held this forenoon at 10 o'clock with all the members present. They are: F. M. Wilkins, T. G. Hendricks, Alton Hampton, W. W. Calkins and Darwin Brantow. Mr. Wilkins, who is a member of the commission by virtue of his being the retiring mayor, as provided in the ordinance creating the commission, was chosen president, and W. W. Calkins, the member chosen from the city council, was elected secretary. City Treasurer Frank Robinson was the choice for treasurer of the commission.

Messrs. Wilkins, Calkins and Brantow were appointed as a committee to draft by-laws. Reports of the work done on Hendricks' park indicated that it would be necessary to ask the city council for an additional appropriation of \$800 to complete the work mapped out for this year. Already the park has been fenced in and a well-graded road has been built from one end of the tract to the other. The improvements contemplated for this year include the construction of a well for a supply of good drinking water.

TYPHOID EPIDEMIC IN DOUGLASS COUNTY TOWN

Dr. A. C. Seeley, county health officer, has returned from a trip to Elkton, where he investigated the typhoid epidemic. He found ill with the malady four children of the late James G. Lyons, who died a few weeks ago. Only one of these cases, that of Rose Lyons, aged 12, is considered serious at present. A fifth child recently recovered from the disease, as did Clayton Gray, a daughter of Dr. M. J. Gray, and Mrs. Dean Cochran, wife of Dean Cochran, the principal of the public school. The sanitary status of the town is very bad, but conditions will be bettered soon under orders given by Dr. Seeley. —Roseburg Review.

ROOF BLAZE BRINGS OUT DEPARTMENT

This forenoon about 10:45 flames were discovered issuing from the kitchen roof at the residence of J. O. West at the corner of East Seventh and Pearl streets. The alarm was turned in and in a very few seconds the new fire team with the chemical engine was on the scene. The chemical hose was played on the blaze for a few minutes and it was soon extinguished. A line of hose from a nearby hydrant was laid, but the water was not turned on, as the chemical stream was all that was necessary.

The fire probably originated from a defective flue. Mrs. Watts had an ironing fire in the kitchen stove all forenoon. The fire probably started between the shutters and the ceiling, although Mrs. Watts knew nothing of it until her attention was called to it by some of her neighbors who saw the flames issuing from the roof. Sparks filtering through a crack in the terra cotta flue probably ignited the woodwork and slowly blazed until discovered. The loss will be in the neighborhood of \$100.

ABE RUEF JURY COMPLETE AT LAST

San Francisco, April 22.—When the Ruef trial was resumed today before Judge Dunne, the prosecution challenged Juror Edward Leonard, it appearing that he had served as a petty juror within the last 12 months. The courtroom was crowded when the session opened. All of Ruef's counsel was present, including Henry Ach, who had about recovered from the attack of pneumonia poisoning which he suffered last week. His condition, however, precluded his taking an active part in the proceedings today, and his place was assumed by Mr. Shortridge.

Mayor Schmitz was in court to answer the extortion charges brought against him and Ruef by the grand jury. His case was continued by consent for three weeks. The conspiracy case against Ruef and Dinan was continued to next Saturday.

John P. Gleason was drawn from the special venire to take the place in the box made vacant by the discharge of Juror Leonard. Gleason said he had a fixed opinion as to the guilt or innocence of Ruef. On challenge by the defense he stood aside.

The grand jury met again this afternoon and it is believed the investigation into the affairs of the Home Telephone Company is being concluded. The chief witness is A. B. Cass, president of the company, whose testimony is, it is considered, of vast importance. When the evidence is in it is expected that a vote will be taken upon indictments against several officials of both the Home and the Pacific States Telephone companies.

Mrs. Rev. Homer Street, of Princeton, has offered a reward of \$500 for the recovery of the body of her husband, thought to have been blown into the Deschutes by a dynamite explosion. It is said the river is never above 40 degrees, being always cold.

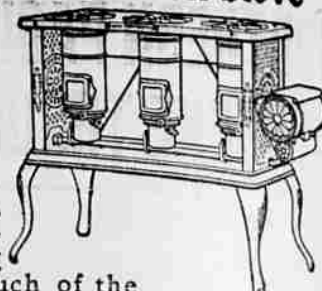
