THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

The efficiency of Eugene's fire department was demonstrated again today. The chemical engine was at the scene of the fire, a couple of blocks from the central station, in one minute after the alarm sounded, and the fire was extinguished with little damage to the dwelling or its contents. Under the old system of fire fighting it would have required the turning on of the water, and probably many household goods would have been destroyed thereby.

The reorganized department, partially paid, has been the best investment Eugene ever made and its efficiency should be steadily increased with the growth of the city. The poorest economy in the world is that which curtails the necessary expense for proper fire protection.

EUGENE SHOULD FIGHT FOR RIGHTS

Now the Southern Pacific Company is spreading the rumor that it is quietly trying to buy land in Eugene for additional trackage, and possibly for terminal purposes. This rumor is intended, of course, to take the place of the perennial new depot promise, which has been on duty so long that it has passed the age limit and has by necessity been retired, to give place to a new and more alluring hoax.

It is safe to say that unless the state railroad commission has the power and inclination to do something for the people, the Southern Pacific will make no changes in its buildings or yards in Eugene for ten years to come. All the company desires is to drain the Willamette Valley of every dollar the traffic will stand, and unless forced to do something will not spend a dollar in betterments.

The Guard advises the shippers of Eugene again, as it frequently has in the past, to fight back at this monopoly with all the weapons they are able to command. They can insist upon the assessor raising the Southern Pacific valuation to not less than \$35,000 a mile, which would be about in accordance with private property valuations in this county, thus decreasing the burden of taxation upon the people, and forcing the railroad to cover into the public treasury some of the money it is extorting in unjust freight rates. They might also route freight shipments from the East in such a manner that the Harriman roads would receive all the short haul, and lastly an appeal, already discussed among the businessmen, should be taken to the state railroad commission, demanding that the Upper Willamette Valley be given freight rates as reasonable as those granted Albany and other points where there is water competition.

This is a fight in which there is no possibility of losing anything—because Eugene has received nothing and is receiving nothing at the hands of the Southern Pacific. There is nothing that the latter could do to harm the city interests and throttle its business and industries that it has not already done. And if nothing more is accomplished by it than forcing the railroad to pay an additional \$25,000 or \$50,000 in taxes annually, the effort will not have been without good results.

NEW STATE CONSTITUTION

Last week Oklahoma's constitutional convention assembled at Guthrie to sign that formidable document upon which the new state's legislative life is founded, the framing of which has been a work of considerable magnitude.

It is said to contain not less than 100,000 words, and is longer than the constitution of any state in the Union. The national constitution, with all its amendments, does not contain

much more than 6000 words—according to those who appear to have taken the trouble to count them.

The constitution was turned over to a committee for editing and revision before it was submitted to the convention for final action, but instead of reducing its length by striking out unnecessary verbiage, the committee immortalized itself by adding a few clauses, so that Oklahoma holds the record by a comfortable margin.

The length of the constitution is directly due to the modern theories of putting additional checks on legislatures and making them more directly amenable to the public will, and the initiative and referendum, direct primary and other Oregon features are included.

There are a number of more or less prominent men—some of 'em editors—who lack the courage to fight the Roosevelt policies themselves, but take advantage of every opportunity to encourage other men to go up against the big stick and get swatted. They belong to the breed of vicarious warriors.

The country should rejoice to know that the D. A. R., in national convention assembled, have gone on record as favoring peace between nations. This does not, of course, affect the right of the Daughters to continue scrapping with each other.

Advocates of a national inheritance tax find encouragement in the decision of the United States supreme court upholding the validity of the New York law, not only to tax property passed by a will, but also under power of appointment.

If something isn't done to stop the editorial tendency to mix the identity of John Temple Graves, editor, and John Wesley Graves, congressman, the two Johns may have to swear out search warrants to find "where they are at."

Thaw's intention to engage a bunch of new lawyers for the next hour may have been brought about by a desire to secure a new batch of picturesque terms to take the place of the "brainstorm" series.

GOOD WEATHER IN WESTERN OREGON

Weather Bureau Sends Out Bulletin On Oregon Climatic Conditions. Sunshine and Light Showers.

The following is from the regular bulletin of the weather bureau, covering a period of a week ending Monday, April 22:

General Summary.
The weather during the week was very pleasant, with an abundance of bright sunshine. Light showers occurred nearly everywhere on Wednesday and Thursday and the rain held over in the northwestern counties during the greater part of Friday. The temperature averaged about 8 degrees above normal in all the counties west of the Cascade mountains, and about three degrees below normal in the counties east of this range of mountains. In the latter district frequent frosts were reported, but they did no damage of consequence. In the western counties a few light frosts occurred on Saturday and Sunday morning, but they were too light to cause any harm worth mentioning. The winds were generally light, but with a sufficient movement to cause a rapid drying of the top soil and by the end of the week the roads were dusty although there was ample moisture in the ground below the surface.

Coast District.
Bay City, Tillamook county.—Generally warm and showery weather prevailed during the fore part of the week, but the latter part was clear.
Port Orford, Curry county.—The weather was mild, with light showers on three days.
Fairview, Coos county.—Clear weather during the entire week, except last two days. Northwest winds prevailed.

Willamette Valley.
Portland, Multnomah county.—The cool, showery weather of the fore part of the week was succeeded by clear and warm weather on Friday, which continued during the remainder of the week. On Sunday afternoon abnormally high temperatures prevailed.
McMinnville, Yamhill county.—The first of the week was clear, after which there was a short spell of cloudy weather, with light showers. The week closed with clear skies.

Salem, Marion county.—Cloudy weather, with light rain during the fore part of the week, was followed by clear and warmer during the latter part.
Corvallis, Benton county.—The first two days of the week were warm and clear, but during the remainder of the week the weather was showery with warm days and nights. There were no frosts or high winds.

Southern Oregon.
Grants Pass, Josephine county.—The week was generally clear. No rain occurred. High afternoon winds prevailed during the latter part of the week.
