PLANS FOR REORGANIZING SECURITIES CO.

New Company Will Be Formed With Capital of \$1,500,000 - J. W. Wheeler Will Take 400,000 Shares at 60 Cents and 400,000 Shares at 20 Cents

The Cottage Grove Western Oregon tells of the plans of the reorganization of the Oregon Securities Company as follows:
"It is understood that it is proposed to reorganize the company and steps to that end will be taken immediately after the sale is confirmed. It is now planned to form a new company capitalized at \$1,500,000. The shares of stock will be 1,500,000 at the par value of \$1. Of this 1,500,000 shares of stock, 400,000 will be preferred, bearing 7 per cent interest. The remainder, 1,100,000, is common. The preferred stock will be sold at 60 cents a share and the common at 20 cents.
The old company owed \$300,000 borrowed money, and a year's interest, together with some miscellaneous items, brings the indebtedness up to \$320,000. J. W. Wheeler proposes to take the 400,000 shares of preferred stock at 60 cents, bringing \$240,000, and 400,000 shares of common stock at 20 cents, netting \$80,000, which will produce \$320,000. This sum will pay the indebtedness of the company, but will leave it without funds for deep development. There remains 700,000 shares which it is proposed to offer the stockholders of the old company in proportion to their holdings, they paying 20 cents per share, the same as Mr. Wheeler pays. Thus if a stockholder in the old company holds 1000 shares of stock, he may take 1-500 of the 1,500,000 shares or 300 shares at 20 cents, paying therefor \$60. But if any modification should be made in the plan of reorganization, different from the outline as set above, it can be positively stated that any stockholder of the old company who may desire to retain his interest in the new company can retain such interest at the same rate per share of stock as Mr. Wheeler pays for his stock. The 700,000 shares which might be called treasury stock will produce \$140,000, which will be used for the deep development of the mine. If the stockholders of the old Securities Company do not want any stock in the new company and abandon it, the 700,000 shares of the new company will be put upon the open market at a price greater than 20 cents.

FATHER AND SON PROBABLY DROWNED

Tacoma, April 26.—It is feared that S. W. Waddell, of Bellingham, and his twelve-year-old son, Sinclair, have been drowned while fishing in the Narrows, west of Tacoma. They came here on April 4th to fish, and established a camp, but letters addressed to them were returned to Mrs. Waddell, who came to investigate and found the camp deserted.

EDITOR McMANUS TELLS WHY HE KILLED ESTES

Pendleton, Or., April 25.—John P. McManus, editor of the Pilot Rock Record, who is now on trial for his life for the killing of Robert Estes, took the stand today in his own behalf and before a crowd which taxed the courtroom to its utmost capacity, fully half of whom were women, told in detail his version of the shooting and the events leading up to it. He contradicted the testimony of all witnesses who have stated that he said he wanted the gun to kill any one with, and said:
"I purchased it to protect myself from the thieves and robbers who had taken my money and who were following me like burglars."
He insisted that he was being robbed when he shot Estes, and that the discovery frightened him so that he pulled the gun and fired without having really intended to do so. He insisted that he did not know who the man was when he shot, and that it was through fear of being sandbagged or killed that he drew the revolver, after striking the man with his arm, and that being easy on the trigger it went off prematurely.
The state rested its case about 11 o'clock, and as the defendant was kept on the stand for an hour on direct examination, he was not cross-examined until after noon and then only for about ten minutes.

COMPANY E. ORDERED FOR COTTAGE GROVE

Dr. Waldo Chestre, of Eugene, Will Give Physical Examination and General Fincer Will Muster in the Men - Orders From O. N. G. Headquarters

The following orders from headquarters of the Oregon National Guard are self-explanatory:
General Orders—No. 7.
Headquarters Oregon National Guard, Adjutant General's Office, Portland, April 24, 1907.
1. J. C. Johnson and 103 other citizens of Cottage Grove, Oregon, subject to military duty, have made application to organize a military company under the laws and regulations of the Oregon National Guard. They are directed to assemble in Cottage Grove, Oregon, Tuesday, April 30, at 8 o'clock p. m., for physical examinations. All applicants for enlistment having successfully passed the physical examination will be mustered into the service of the state.
2. Captain Waldo L. Chestre, assistant surgeon, First Separate Battalion, will proceed to Cottage Grove on the above date and be present at the hour specified in paragraph 1, in order to conduct the physical examination of all applicants for enlistment into the service of the state. The expense incurred is necessary in the military service.
3. Immediately upon completion of muster in an election for captain will be held. Brigadier General W. E. Fincer, adjutant general, is designated as mustering in officer, and will act as inspector of election, pursuant to regulations. The expense incurred is necessary in the military service.
4. This organization will be known as Separate Company E.
By order of the commander-in-chief, W. E. FINDER, Adjutant-General.

SHORTER ROUTE FROM PLEASANT HILL

Springfield Commercial Club Wants Free Ferry Across River So Farmers Will Go There To Trade.

At the last meeting of the Springfield Commercial Club a committee was appointed to make a trip to the Pleasant Hill valley to interview the farmers of that neighborhood in regard to establishing a new and more direct route to Springfield, crossing the river at some convenient point by free ferry. Those who were appointed on the committee were C. W. Ryehard, Paul Bettelheim and H. M. Stewart. Monday was the day set for the interview, and the gentlemen, accompanied by a News representative, started out to interview the farmers along the proposed route of the new road.
P. N. Shelley, W. F. Drury, A. J. Warburton, P. N. Laird and W. R. and E. R. Latin were all approached and in every instance the gentlemen heartily approved of the move and offered to assist in building the road. Every man who was approached by the committee was very enthusiastic over the prospects of getting a road to Springfield that would save them, on the round trip, a distance of over four miles. For lack of time the committee was disappointed in not seeing others, but it was left to the above gentlemen to lay the plans before their neighbors and try and interest them. It was left to them to set a date and place for a meeting, giving them the promise that a large delegation of Springfield citizens would meet with them on any date they may set and talk over the best and most feasible route.
The farmers in the locality of the proposed road, together with Springfield, will circulate a petition for either a new ferry or that the one that is now at Jasper be moved down the river about three miles.—News.
