SECURES ANOTHER TOP-NOTCHER FOR EUGENE

Management of Eugene Theatre Will Present San Francisco Opera Company here May 14th in the Comic Opera "Fantasma."

George H. Smith today received contracts from the Northwestern Theatrical Association for the appearance at the Eugene theatre on Tuesday, April 14, for one night, of the San Francisco Opera Company. The announcement that this splendid opera company is to appear in Eugene should meet with the approbation of all lovers of things musical. Organized after the San Francisco catastrophe by Frank W. Healy, assistant manager of the Tivoli opera house, from the members of

that splendid company, the San Francisco Opera Company has toured the entire country, meeting with phenomenal success. As at present constituted it is doubtful if any company, since the famous Bostonians, could compare with the San Francisco Opera Company in point of general excellence. Alda Hemmi, one of the most beautiful women, and one of the most cultured sopranos on the operatic stage, is the prima donna of the organization. In addition to being a beautiful woman, Miss Hemmi is acknowledged one of the best dressers on the stage, and the gowns worn by her never fail to create a flutter among the female portion of the audience. Teddy Webb and George Kunkel are the comedians. Mr. Webb held forth at the Tivoli opera house for some twelve years, and no artist that ever appeared at the famous San Francisco institution was more dearly beloved by the theatre-going public than the little fun-maker. George Kunkel, the tall comedian, has to his credit some of the greatest successes of the Tivoli. He is a splendid foil for Webb, and they keep the audience in a continual roar of laughter while on the stage. Carl Hayden, a handsome tenor, the possessor of a most beautiful voice, who previous to joining the San Francisco Opera Company sang the principal tenor parts with DeWolf Hopper in "Happyland," and last season with John Cort's Stewart Opera Company, and J. Albert Wallerstedt, the baritone, are two young artists who jumped into popularity with a bound, when they made their first bid before a San Francisco audience. Maude Bentley, the contralto, is also a most beautiful woman, and her high tones are remarkable for their clarity and the low tones have the depth of a grand organ. Melvin Stokes, light comedian, and Amy Leicester, are also most popular players.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

John D. Rockefeller has given \$2,000,000 more to the Chicago University, making \$21,316,922 in all. The most serious defeat ever received by a Northwest college was given at Pullman Friday when the Washington State College won the annual track and field meet with the University of Montana by the overwhelming score of 99 to 27. The state college took 12 firsts, 11 seconds and six thirds. Montana won the high jump at 5 feet 6 1/2 inches, and the discus at 107 feet 2 inches. The state college record for the 100 yard dash, 10 1-5 seconds, was tied by Meyer, and the record in the half-mile, shot-put and hammer-throw broken.
