UNIVERSITY VACATION IS OVER

Students Back to Resume Their Work - Pullman Will Be Here May 17 for Track Meet - Oregon Idaho Football Game to Be Played in Portland October 26

Studies and recitations at the university were resumed this morning, after the regular April vacation. A large majority of the students went home, but some stayed here, while a number were engaged in the work of surveying for a proposed pipe line for city water works. All feel that the vacation has done them good and are back to their studies with renewed vigor.

Pullman Track Meet.

The Oregon track team will meet the crack track team of Washington State College May 17 on Kincaid field. The Oregon men will soon begin to prepare for that meet. Though a general impression has prevailed that Pullman will be easy meat, according to latest advice in their native state, the University of Montana, whom they beat 99 to 27, they will be quite a tough nut for Oregon to crack. However, Oregon expects to be able to do that.

The Washington team seems to be very well balanced, and especially strong in the distances, the quarter, half and mile. Oregon, however, conceding she loses most of the places in these events, will probably have plenty of points to spare in the weights and sprints, the hurdles, the jumps and pole vault.

Play Idaho in Portland.

Much to the sorrow of most of the students, provisional arrangements have been made for the use of the Multnomah Club grounds in Portland to meet the University of Idaho football team on October 26. Manager Kestley thought it best to play the inland team in Portland, on account of expenses, he calculating that the gate receipts will be bigger there. Idaho will have a very strong team, and the game will be one of the most interesting of the schedule.

Disastrous Baseball Trip.

The Whitman College team defeated the Oregon nine Saturday by the score of 6 to 4 in what was said to be the fastest game ever played at Walla Walla in college circles. That game was the fifth straight that Oregon lost on the trip, one to a Colfax league team, two to Pullman, and one to the University of Idaho at Moscow. From reports Oregon seems to be weak in her pitchers, none of them performing as well as their opposing substitutes. The team probably suffered from the trip also, for after they met Multnomah and the Dalles their fortune failed.

Champions of Eight States.

By beating Utah Friday night, Oregon became the champion in debate of eight states, for while Oregon had won the championship of only three states had beaten the representative institutions of Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and Nevada. The victory here is really the greatest that has ever been won by Oregon, and the men who won it, F. V. Galloway and J. C. Ventell, will go down in history as the greatest debaters of the university. Utah is famous for the friendly ability of her students, and it is rare that her colors are lowered in that line of student activity. It is to be hoped that more debates will be held with the Mormons.

SCOPE OF EXPOSITION AT JAMESTOWN

The Jamestown ter-centennial exposition at Norfolk, Va., the object of which is to celebrate the foundation of the first permanent English-speaking settlement in America laid at Jamestown, Va., May 13th, 1607, was opened this noon by President Roosevelt, and will close at midnight November 30, 1907.

Three small barks anchored just off the peninsula which jutted into the James river about 20 miles from its mouth May 13, 1607. Besides the crews of the little boats there were 105 English-speaking adventurers who had left their native land, braved the terrors of the deep, faced the unknown fate of the pioneer in the wilderness to establish a home and a colony in a new world. Famine, fever and war with the natives thinned the band of pioneers, but out of it all comes the story of an Indian maid of 14 who saved the white leader's life. She was Pocahontas, the dusky princess, who afterward married an Englishman, and as a young bride visited the English court, where she received the honors accorded to royal blood.

Jamestown was a vice-regal court and later, Williamsburg was even more brilliant, but there is other romance besides that of the safer kind. There is a picturesque story and beauty in the spectacle of war, and the ter-centennial territory has been a frequent war theatre. Through the centuries the Indians massacred the whites, the French fought the English and the English the Dutch. We have had two wars with England and one bloody fraternal struggle, and the soil of Virginia each time has been laced with the blood of the combatants.

The exposition will be held on the waters and shores of Hampton Roads, the largest and best landlocked harbor on the Atlantic seaboard—five miles distant from the city of Norfolk and in equal proximity to Newport News, Portsmouth, Hampton and Old Point Comfort, Virginia. The exposition site contains approximately 400 acres of land space, a 40-acre enclosed water basin and 160 square miles of water surface of Hampton Roads. The exposition may be reached by water from all the seaboard cities by rail, without change except for ferries. It is an all parts of the country. Seven trunk lines terminate at Norfolk and 16 lines of steamships leave the harbor. All of the circumjacent cities have ferries and launches running to the exposition, and Norfolk is further connected with the city by four trolley lines and one steam railway. The exposition site has a frontage of two miles on Hampton Roads, and one-half mile on Bonah creek. The other sides of the exposition grounds are enclosed by a decorative pine and wire fence, covered with honeysuckle, crimson rambling rose and trumpet vines. The exposition is a great red and white city—Gothic columns flanking walls. Shade trees are in abundance; groves of fruit trees on the grounds and unnumbered beds of native flowers and decorative plants.

MRS. POTTER PALMER.

Chicago Society Leader and Her Interest in Capital and Labor.

There are few more clever and versatile women than Mrs. Potter Palmer of Chicago, who entertained labor representatives and millionaires recently at her splendid mansion with the view of starting a branch of the National Civic Federation in Chicago. During the Columbian exposition Mrs. Palmer was very much in the public eye on account of being chairman of the board of lady managers of the fair, and while she has not enjoyed an equal degree of publicity since, she has by no means been in seclusion. She is a society leader, whose influence in social matters is based both on her personal charms and on her progressiveness and activity in movements for the general good. The gathering at her residence a short time ago was in many respects the most remarkable ever witnessed in Chicago. In the art gallery of her mar-

ble palace on Lake Shore drive, amid rare paintings and sculptures and the elegance conferred by the combination of wealth and taste, captains of industry chatted with heavy handed sons of toil. Stereoscopic views of employees at work under deplorable conditions were contrasted with those showing men and women working where means had been used to make them comfortable and contented while at their labor. It is said that the welfare department of the Civic Federation has accomplished much by urging employers to better the surroundings of those who labor for them.

Mrs. Palmer was Bertha Honoré of Louisville and married the great merchant whose name she now bears in 1871. He died in 1902. She has been much in Europe the past few years.

The present admiral was born in Cambridge, Mass., in 1845, graduated from the Naval academy in 1864 and was promoted to his present rank in 1904.
