KELLY BRINGS FAME TO THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Oregon has been brought to prominence by the wonderful athletic feats of Dan Kelly. The following from the New York Sun is a sample of the many notices the institution is receiving in the East:

"Dan Kelly, of the University of Oregon, and the world's record holder in the 100-yard and 220-yard runs, is likely to add to these titles something in the broad jumping line. Only recently in practice for the first time in the season Kelly gave himself a tryout. He leaped 23 feet 4 inches. Last year Kelly leaped 21 feet 2 1/4 inches, and he and his friends believe that with a start like this he will make Princeton's American record take a back seat, and that he may even attack O'Conners' world's mark."

Leland Stanford and Oregon are to have a dual meet this spring (the meet has been called off) and the Oregonians expect that with Kelly in form they are sure of the two sprints and the broad jump. Oregon lost a good man in Frideaux, who ran a quarter mile on a straightaway track in 59.1-5 seconds last year. He overworked himself in his studies to keep up his high grade and has been forced to leave college. Few athletes suffer this way."

CECIL MOFFITT KICKED ON HEAD BY A HORSE

Junction Boy Badly Injured By One of the Farm Horses—No Bones Broken But He Will Be Laid Up for Some Time.
