## BOOTH-KELLY COMPANY BURNS ITS SLASHINGS

Complying With New Forest Fire Law Compelling All Logging Firms to Burn Once a Year - Take Advantage of Present Dry Weather. Did Not Spread to Dry Timber.

The Booth-Kelly Lumber Company has just completed the burning of its slashings under the requirements of the new forest fire law. The new law requires that all corporations or firms doing a logging business shall burn all their slashings once each year and are compelled to do so between the first of October and the first of June. If any burning is done at any other time a written permission from the state fire warden must be secured.

The Booth-Kelly Company, taking advantage of the present warm and dry weather, stopped all logging operations a few days ago and put the men to work burning the slashings. The brush burned very well, all of it being destroyed. The men watched the fire till it burned out, and then went back to logging after laying off only two days. The fire did not spread to the green timber in a single instance, and no damage whatever was done. The burning of the slashings at this time will be the means of preventing many forest fires during the hot and dry part of the summer.

The logging districts in which the burns were made were at Wendling, Fall Creek, Saginaw, and Winberry, and at each place the territory over which the fire spread was large, but nowhere did it get beyond control of the men watching it, as the surrounding timber and brush were not dry enough.

All other logging and sawmill firms should make their burnings at this time, when the slashings are just right to burn well and everything else is too green and wet to allow the fire to spread.

## EUGENE PEOPLE ARRESTED AT OREGON CITY

Mrs. Rosa Fisher and Her Sister, Lillian Bell, Ray Littlefield and Jas. Osburn Caught in Raid on Lodging House.

Oregon City, April 29.—In a raid last night on the Thornton lodging house, at Twelfth and Main streets, by Chief of Police Burns and Night Officers Shaw and Cooke, four people were landed in the city jail on a serious charge. Mrs. Rosa E. Fisher was found in a room with James Osburn, and in another room officers found Lillian Bell and Ray H. Littlefield. Information of the criminal relations of the quarter were given the officers by Mrs. Sarah Jane Bell, mother of the two women, who came down from Eugene last night and swore out a complaint before City Recorder Dimmick. She stated that the men and her daughters have been in Washington, but she received word that they came here about ten days ago.

The husband of Mrs. Fisher is employed in the paper mills at West Oregon City. Littlefield and Miss Bell were married this morning by Circuit Judge McBride, and information was returned by the district attorney's office against Mrs. Fisher and Osburn, who pleaded guilty. Osburn was fined \$50 or 25 days in jail. Sentence in the case of Mrs. Fisher was suspended.
