OPTION ON LARGE TRACT OF COAL AND OIL LAND

Great American Company Headed by
W. Hutchings, of Portland, Will
Operate Few Miles South of Eugene - Coal Said to Have Been
Found

The Great American Company, of which W. Hutchings, formerly interested in the Spencer Butte Company, is president, has taken options on a large tract of land from six to nine miles south of Eugene and will at once begin the work of prospecting for coal. A gasoline drill has been taken to the property and a prospect hole will be sunk at once.

Over four hundred acres of land have been bonded and the tract includes the old Powell place and the Goshaw place between Goshaw and Creswell. It is said that a good three foot ledge of coal has been found near the surface and it is expected that deeper a splendid vein can be found. There are also indications that a deposit of coal oil exists there, and efforts will be made to locate it. Besides Mr. Hutchings there are several other Portland people and a number of Eugene people, including Councilman A. W. Gilbert, who are interested in the project. A party of promoters left here early this morning for the property, and are spending the day there looking over the ground.
