BEZDEK WILL NOT BE HERE NEXT YEAR

University Athletic Council Refuses to Allow Him an Advance of \$500 in Salary and Elects Frost Football Coach for 1907 - Oregon May Join A. A. U.

The athletic council of the university last night refused to allow a raise of \$500 in the salary of Physical Director Bezdek, and as he will not consider anything less, they elected George Frost, who coached Seattle high last year, coach for 1907. Frost will receive \$350, but will coach only football, while Bezdek did the work in the gymnasium, coached football, basketball, and baseball successfully for \$2500.

Frost, before he handled the Seattle high, coached the Texas Institute. At the Seattle high, however, he put out a team that beat Lick high and Chicago high, and played the university to a 4 to 9 score. He is a graduate of Portsmouth.

Head Coach Bezdek leaves many friends, who are sorry to see him go. He has been by far the best all-around man that Oregon has ever had, and has won the regard of a host of Oregon people, including several regents. He says that he is quite satisfied that the council did not take up his proposition of \$2000, for he hopes to study medicine at Chicago. After three years there he will go to Vienna, Austria, to complete his course. There is, however, a possibility that he may take up some business propositions of influential friends, or even continue

in his work in athletics. In the latter case he will prove himself exceedingly valuable, and the Oregon students are very glad that he will not in all likelihood go to some other Northwestern institution and Oregon will not have to face the results of his truly remarkable ability.

Recommend A. A. U. The athletic council also recommended that the student body join the A. A. U., and that matter will be brought up at the next student body meeting, which occurs on Wednesday. It is almost certain to pass, and from thence on Oregon will have her men registered. The cost will be only \$7.50.

Manager Rafferty, of the baseball team, was also granted permission to play the Eugene Colts Friday afternoon at 3:15 p. m., and to make one or two other changes in his schedule. Manager McCarty was also granted permission to meet Pullman here May 17, and to go to O. A. C. with the track team on May 24. The date for the Idaho meet was also ratified.

Darwin Bristow is named as executor in the will. The instrument was drawn up and signed on April 15, 1907.
