BOOST FOR EUGENE

Pendleton is in the field with a "20,000 club." The object is to boost the town, talk new industries, help increase population and advance the interests of the town in every way in order to swell the population to 20,000 as quickly as possible. Of other inland cities Spokane has a "500,000 club" and Walla Walla a "500,000 club." It's a way they have up in that country of hustle and push. The idea is one that might well be taken up here in Eugene. This city is probably larger than Pendleton and with the immediate building of city and suburban car lines should forge ahead more rapidly than the ambitious town across the mountains. Then a "25,000 club" would be a modest name for a new organization of boosters.

As in all boosting organizations, there need be no fixed program nor line of work, and perhaps nothing further than a formal organization and the adoption of badges bearing the legend "25,000 population for Eugene," to be worn by all members on gala occasions, and to be printed on all literature used in the city as for as possible.

By the way, what has become of that experimental irrigation project planned for this spring? The present dry spell and attendant injury to late crops is an object lesson of the need of artificial watering in order to insure a regular and certain yield. We have rain enough in Oregon, and some to spare, but it does not always come at the right time, and irrigation would supply the lack. Intensified farming in small tracts is what will bring prosperity and population to the Willamette valley and it will be discovered in the course of time that irrigation must be resorted to in order to make possible this desirable state of affairs. For this reason we had hoped that the government would be able to give the promised object lesson in irrigation this year, as had been planned.

Here's another good intention gone wrong. A South Carolinian, intending to compliment both men, whom he greatly admires, publicly said he guessed the reason Roosevelt and Tillman did not get on very well together was that they were too much alike. He'll hardly get a letter of thanks from either.

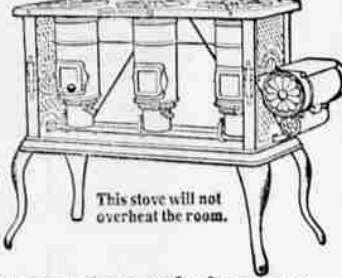
OREGON STATE NEWS

WELDRUM IS ALLOWED TIME TO SETTLE UP

Henry Meldrum, ex-surveyor-general for Oregon, has been allowed until next Saturday to arrange his private affairs before going to McNeil's Island and commencing service of his sentence of three years' imprisonment.

The matter was taken up with United States Attorney Bristol and Marshal Reid by Richard W. Montague, Meldrum's lawyer. Mr. Bristol was agreeable to allowing until Saturday, and if necessary, a further extension of time may be allowed. Meldrum was required to go to Washington as a witness for the government, and arrived home only last Friday. The long trip to Washington and the protracted stay at the capital necessarily interfered with his private business. At the time of leaving for Washington the decision of the United States circuit court against him had not been announced. Consequently the federal authorities are disposed to allow him a reasonable time in which to prepare for his enforced absence from the walks of private life. —Portland Telegram.
