TRUST-BUSTING FARCE

With all the talk of the last two years about a trust-busting campaign it will be noted that all of the big combinations in restraint of trade are still doing business at the same old stands. Standard Oil continues to control the market and boost prices; the paper trust is still forcing prices upward, as every newspaper publisher is aware, and the railroads, as the lumbermen of Oregon well know, are raising freight tariffs at will and defying the orders of state railroad boards with impunity. Never was the control of the trusts upon the necessities of life stronger than it is today, after all the noise that has been made by the official "busters," and numberless expensive trials have resulted in nothing more than the imposition of ridiculously small fines upon those found guilty of infractions of the anti-trust laws.

What the country wants is something practical—punishment drastic enough against the offenders to deter them from further violations of the statutes. Prison sentences against those higher up would soon put a stop to financial buccannery, but nothing short of it will ever be effective. Rockefeller and men of his class are willing to sacrifice their clerks upon the altar of justice, or to pay monetary penalties, which in reality must be borne by the consumers of their goods.

What is needed also is honest consistency in this campaign for free competition in trade, and that we can never have as long as such trust barons as Andrew Carnegie are set up on pedestals and worshipped because of their liberality with the money they have extorted from their fellows. "But the trusts" must mean more than a political rallying cry, or the slogan of the demagogue, if anything is to be accomplished toward the commercial emancipation of the country.

The Daily Guard is compelled to increase the number of its pages today in order to carry its constantly increasing business. The growth of this paper during the past year has not been equalled by that of any other publication in Oregon. In circulation and volume of advertising it has amounted to a veritable boom that is increasing from day to day. This condition we believe reflects largely the growth of the city and tributary country, and is only a forerunner of the era of prosperity and development that is coming to the Willamette Valley.

Lane county's sawmills are at the point of closing down because of the scarcity of cars, due to the dog-in-the-manger policy of the Harriman railroad trust. Not only have the Southern Pacific managers refused to increase facilities and equipment, but they have blocked every attempt of other lines to enter this territory and afford relief to the shipping interests of the state until business in all lines is being paralyzed by lack of proper transportation facilities and growth and development are checked pending relief that seems far in the future.

An Oregon exchange says: Two woolen mills in the East have consolidated and are looking for a location in the West. The company contemplates spending between \$40,000 and \$50,000 on a new brick plant and new machinery will take \$30,000 additional stock, and want the people wherever they may locate to take \$20,000 more. The Walla Walla Commercial Club has taken the matter up with a view of securing the plant and payroll of between 60 and 100 operators.

We trust that no meeting held under the wings of the white dove

will find it necessary to adopt the resolution: "If any man or woman refuses to be peaceful, knock him or her down and drag him or her out," in order to keep order.

University Appropriations.

(LaGrande Observer.)
To those who have not taken the trouble to investigate what other states are appropriating for the support of their universities, the appropriation of \$125,000 for the support of our state university may seem to be a large sum, but when the figures of other states are compared, it will be noted that we are far from making any new records. For instance, our sister state, Washington, has just appropriated \$225,000 per year; Idaho, \$250,000 for the next two years; California, \$1,000,000 per annum; Illinois the same; Iowa, \$550,000; Minnesota, \$743,000; Kansas, \$250,000. It will be noted that our appropriation of \$125,000 per annum still leaves us at the foot of the ladder. However, this amount will permit of expansion, both as to the erection of additional buildings, as well as in educational features. We hope when the petitions arrive in this county asking that the appropriation be held up that it will meet with little encouragement.
