SPRINKLING RESOLUTION IS PASSED

As announced in yesterday's Guard the council met last evening for the purpose of devising some means for keeping the streets sprinkled. The outcome of the meeting was the passing of a resolution declaring it the sense of the council that upon petition of a majority of property owners along the streets wished to be sprinkled the sprinkling shall be done by the city and the costs assessed to the owners.
