BIG ELECTRIC PLANT WEST OF JUNCTION CITY

B. F. Howard Owner of the Light
Plant at Junction, Files on Wa-
ter of Bear Creek and is Said to
Be Organizing Company to Op-
erate Plant

B. F. Howard, owner of the Junction City electric light plant, yesterday afternoon filed with the county clerk notice of appropriation of the waters of Bear creek, a stream west of Junction, for the purpose of generating power for the operation of an electric light plant.

According to the papers filed with the county clerk, Mr. Howard appropriates 450 cubic inches of water, miners' measure, under a six-inch pressure. The canal is to be three-fourths of a mile in length, and four feet wide by two feet deep. The point of diversion is a southeasterly line of the northeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 24, tp. 16, south of range 6 west, being on the donation land claim of Reuben Draper. The name of the canal is the Howard Electric Light and Power Company's canal.

The site of the proposed canal and power plant is about two miles east of Goldson and eight miles southwest of Junction. While Mr. Howard's plans are not fully known it is said he intends to build a big electric plant there for the purpose of furnishing Junction City and other towns, if need be, with light and power. He is now interesting capital in the project, it is said, and may soon incorporate a company that will be plenty able to complete the plans outlined by him.

HORACE MCKINLEY IS NOW LOCATED IN CHINA

Oregon Fugitive Negotiating With
Chinese Government for Mining
Concessions.

Dan W. Tarpley, of Portland, formerly a resident of this city for many years, was in the city yesterday visiting his parents, who reside here, says the Salem Statesman. Mr. Tarpley has recently returned from Washington, D. C., where he was a witness in the famous Hermann trial. It will be remembered that Mr. Tarpley figured as one of the principals in the first of the land fraud cases, known as seven-o'clock, and that he with Horace G. McKinley, S. A. D. Puter and Emma Watson were found guilty of conspiracy to defraud the government in the land department. Of the four Mr. Puter waived his motion for a new trial, and is now serving a two-year sentence in the Multnomah county jail. Miss Watson is in Oakland, Cal., under bonds waiting the passing on a motion for a new trial. Mr. McKinley, well-known in Salem, left the country, forfeiting his bonds of \$4000 and his location has been a mystery to the government officials up to the present, but a reporter of the Statesman was shown a letter from him yesterday dated in April from Tientsin, China, in which he states that he is negotiating with the Chinese government for some mining concessions, and he will undoubtedly make a large sum of money out of his venture. A peculiar feature of the case which involves Mr. Tarpley is the death of Judge Bellinger, under whom they were tried, before passing on a motion for a new trial, and now, after a lapse of two and a half years, it is still undecided and Mr. Tarpley and Miss Watson are out under bonds awaiting this decision.

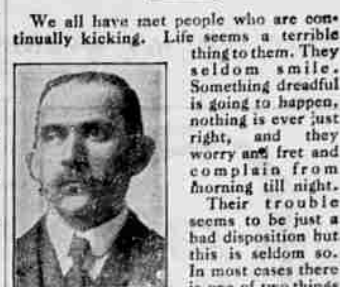

BUSINESS SOON

Geo. A. Dorris, who is famous for having what is reputed to be the finest hopyard in the world on his farm a mile above Springfield, intends to go out of the hop business soon and will devote his entire attention to other branches of farming. He has already plowed up a portion of his yard and will have only a few acres in hops this year. Mr. Dorris gives as his reason for this action the high price of labor, the scarcity of pickers, and the uncertainty of the market during the past few years. He says under the present conditions a small grower can make nothing at the business, and he has determined to apply some of his energy which has been seemingly wasted upon hops the past few years to something that will bring him better returns. He is right now engaged in the raising of asparagus, shipping a large amount of it to Portland, where he receives a fancy price. He will increase the acreage of his asparagus beds and will probably supply other markets on the coast with this product.
