BUILD THE ELECTRIC ROAD

Yesterday there was a great mass meeting in Roseburg, a holiday having been proclaimed by the mayor, and all business houses being closed during the afternoon. Representatives from Coos county brought the word that each member of the committee already appointed at that end of the line would take \$15,000 worth of stock in the proposed Roseburg-Marshfield electric road, and a vast deal of enthusiasm was manifested. Committees were appointed to confer with the Coos county towns and at a meeting of these representatives, soon to be held on the bay, it is expected to formally launch the corporation which will construct the proposed line. All the stock, it is asserted confidently, will be quickly subscribed in Douglas and Coos counties and work will be pushed on the project without a moment of unnecessary delay.

Again the Guard wishes to impress upon the people of Eugene and Lane county that they will do well to emulate the example of our sister counties on the south, and make a determined effort to work out their own salvation on the transportation question. Lane county is well able to build an electric road seventy miles long to Siuslaw tidewater, which would carry all our lumber and farm products to the ocean, as well as bringing in freight for our merchants, making Eugene an important jobbing center for a large area of territory.

Now is the time to get busy—while the spirit of progress is abroad in the land.

GOOD RAILROAD NEWS

The news in today's Guard of the incorporation of the Eugene & Eastern Electric Railroad Company will be received with general satisfaction. If the plans of the promoters are carried out Eugene will in a few years become one of the most important jobbing points on the coast, for which purpose it is ideally situated. Located at the head of the great Willamette valley, with a vast lumbering and agricultural country naturally tributary, a splendid residence city with the best educational advantages on the coast, it is destined to grow rapidly in the future, and especially so if an enterprise like the Eugene & Eastern railroad is consummated, as planned.

The Willamette Valley Company is undoubtedly able from a financial standpoint to build an electric road from this city through to Eastern Oregon and we believe that they intend to do it. Electric roads are easily extended, section by section, and cheaply operated, and the Guard believes that the beginning of construction on the Eugene-Springfield line will mean the first step in the building of a system that will in a few years extend throughout the Willamette valley, and cross the mountains, as planned by the promoters of the Eugene & Eastern company.

According to the Bureau of Labor the wholesale prices of farm and

food products show a general and in some instances a large increase for 1907 over 1906. Especially is this noted in cattle and hogs and wheat and products therefrom. The price of steers, from good to choice, shows an increase of about 2.6 per cent, and choice to extra, 2.7 per cent. No figures are given on steaks or roasts, but the consumer is likely to place the increase at 100 per cent. The price of hogs increased 17.8 per cent for heavy and 18.9 per cent for light. Simultaneously the price of bacon went up 17.5 per cent, hams 18.1 per cent, lard 19.1 per cent and salt pork 21.5 per cent. The ratio between the increase in the price of hogs and that of the finished product appears to have been fairly well maintained. While the price of wheat, regular grades, is quoted as increasing 21.5 per cent, it is stated the price of flour decreased 20.4 per cent for "winter straights" and 21.1 per cent for "spring patents."

A whole lot of men not from Missouri will have to be "shown" before they will accept the value of \$1125 placed upon every immigrant by the New York commissioner of immigration. Evidence aplenty can be found in our prisons that thirty cents would be a reckless over-valuation for many of them.
