Street Sprinkling Ordinance Comes
Up But Is Not Passed Because
Willamette Street Petition Is Not
In - Streets Ordered Opened

The regular meeting of the city council was held last night with a full board present. Various matters of interest were taken up. A reading of the proceedings is as follows:

A. C. Woodcock, counsel for the Willamette Valley Company, presented an ordinance granting the company the right to build its street railway through Gross' addition. It will be acted upon later.

The street committee reported that 7944 feet of lumber had been used in crossings and bridges during the month.

Opening Streets.
A petition to open Olive street south to West Seventeenth street was reported favorably and the survey was ordered made.

The matter of opening Willamette street north through the S. P. Co.'s right-of-way to connect with Third street on R. McMurphy's property was discussed, but the majority favored postponement of the matter for the present.

The city attorney was instructed to call the attention of the S. P. Co. to the fact that it still maintains barbed wire fences along its right-of-way in some parts of the city in violation of a city ordinance.

Chairman Calkins, of the fire and water committee reported that the Willamette Valley Company would soon submit a proposition to sell the water plant to the city.

Sprinkling Petitions.
Petitions for sprinkling the following streets were presented:
Willamette, from Eleventh street south to Fifteenth street, from railroad crossing to Twelfth; Eighth, from Pearl to High; Eleventh, from alley west of Charnelton to Alder.

The petition recently circulated to sprinkle Willamette street from the depot to Eleventh street, was not presented for the reason that one of the committee which had the matter in charge forgot to turn it in.

Ordinances.
Two large petitions asking that an ordinance be passed forbidding the Odd Fellows from enlarging their cemetery, which is inside the city limits, and near some very desirable residence districts, was presented and accepted by the council.

A resolution for opening up Madison street its full width between Fourth and Fifth streets was referred to the city attorney for investigation.

The ordinance establishing a grade on Moss avenue between Twelfth and Fifteenth streets was passed.

Another ordinance, providing for the grading and graveling of the same, was also passed.

The ordinance changing the weight of sky rockets from six to eight ounces and providing penalties was passed.

Sprinkling Ordinance.
The much-talked-of street sprinkling ordinance was introduced but it was not passed for the reason that the petition for the sprinkling of Willamette street was not introduced.

A meeting will be held tomorrow night, at which time it will probably pass. The proposed ordinance divides the city into sprinkling districts as follows:

No. 1—Willamette street, from Sixth street to Eleventh.

No. 2—Willamette street, from Eleventh to Fifteenth.

No. 3—Eleventh street, from the alley west of Charnelton street to Alder.

No. 4—Pearl street, from the railroad crossing south to Twelfth street.

No. 5—Eighth street, from Pearl to High street.
