RAIN OF LAST WEEK GENERAL

Weekly Report on Western Oregon
Weather by the Bureau at Port-
land.

Following is the weekly report on Western Oregon weather conditions issued by the bureau at Portland for the week ending Tuesday, May 14:

General Summary.
The weather up to Friday was sunny, with normal temperatures. On Friday rain began falling in the coast counties, which gradually spread to include the entire state. The rains ceased in the western counties Sunday afternoon and in the eastern counties Monday morning. They were sufficiently heavy to effectually break the drought in all districts west of the Cascade mountains. To the east of this range of mountains the rainfall averaged less than one-quarter of an inch, and it was of great benefit, notwithstanding more moisture is still needed in that district. The weather was unusually windy just preceding the beginning of the rain, but no serious damage occurred in consequence of high winds. During the latter part of the week it was cooler than usual, especially during the afternoon, when cloudiness prevented the customary diurnal rise in temperature. No harmful frosts occurred.

Coast District.
Bay City, Tillamook county.—During the fore part of the week the mornings were generally cold and cloudy, and the afternoons warm and clear, but on Thursday morning a mist began to fall that settled into a heavy rain that continued through the night.

Fairview, Coos county.—The first half of the week was clear, but the latter half was cloudy, with high southwest winds Thursday night and Friday morning, which were accompanied by rain.

Willamette Valley.
Portland, Multnomah county.—Clear and warm weather prevailed until Wednesday, when cloudiness set in that developed into rain Friday. Moderate rains continued to fall at intervals until Sunday, when the sky began to clear. The week, however, closed cloudy. The temperatures during the latter part of the week were slightly below normal.

Corvallis, Benton county.—The first four days of the week were clear, but the remainder of the week was cloudy, with moderate rains. No frosts nor high winds occurred.

McKenzie Bridge, Lane county.—The week was warm and pleasant. The winds were mostly from the northwest. Fogs were frequent during the morning hours.

Southern Oregon.
Grants Pass, Josephine county.—The week has been cloudy and cool. Light rain fell on Friday. Light southwest winds prevailed.

Kerby, Josephine county.—The fore part of the week was clear; this clear spell was followed by a moderate rain on Friday. A high wind blew Thursday night.

STORY OF STUNENBERG MURDER AND TRIAL

Boise, Idaho, May 15.—On May 2 William B. Haywood, secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, was placed on trial in the district court at Boise to answer the charge of conspiracy to murder former Governor (of Idaho) Frank Steunenberg, whose death occurred as the result of a bomb explosion at Caldwell, on the night of December 30, 1905. This is the first real step in the attempt to convict the officers of the Western Federation of Miners, viz: Charles Moyer, president; W. B. Haywood, secretary, and George Pettibone, on evidence provided in the alleged confession of Harry Orchard, the murderer.

For several months following the murder, the Steunenberg case was an affair of mere local significance. Upon the arrest of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone the attention of the entire world was attracted to Idaho. The Socialist and labor element rose upon a mass and protested vituperatively against what they claimed was a conspiracy to hang three innocent men. The governors of Colorado and Idaho were charged openly with employing the Pinkertons to carry out a plot, than which none in the history of crime was more inhuman. Judge Frank J. Smith, before whom the case first appeared, was called corrupt and the integrity of the Idaho courts seriously questioned. To all of these assertions the state paid little heed, and continued to strengthen its case with the hope of strengthening its case.

To date the case has cost the defense more than \$100,000. This sum has been expended to compensate the attorneys, Clarence Darrow, of Chicago; E. F. Richardson, of Denver; Fred Miller, of Spokane, and John F. Nugent, and to maintain a vast army of detectives and others, who have been at work taking affidavits among the people of Canyon county in support of a motion for a change of venue. Fifty-six thousand dollars have been spent by Idaho and upon the urgent request of Governor Frank R. Gooding the fifth session of the legislature appropriated an additional \$50,000 for the prosecution. James H. Hawley and United States Senator W. E. Borah are counsel for the state.

Fifteen months have transpired since the arrest of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone. The defense has constantly urged an immediate trial, but it has resorted to numerous legal measures which have impeded progress and made impossible the granting of its plea. In March of this year it asked a dismissal, which was denied. Its motion for a change of venue was granted conditionally, only Ada county being offered in lieu of Canyon. It accepted this alternative and the case was ordered to Ada county.

The crime in which Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone are said to have been implicated occurred at Caldwell, Idaho, December 30, 1905. In execution and execution it was worthy of a Thespian. It can only be described as brutal, hideous, and sinister. Steunenberg was returning his way home at dusk. Light snow was falling. A stiff breeze blew the wet flakes into his face. He pulled his hat well down over his eyes; over his muffled an extra twist, turned up his overcoat collar and bent into the breeze, hastening toward home, where a devoted wife, rollicking children and a warm fire awaited him. It was but a few days after Christmas—the millinery, as it were, when the knowledge of man was common and man had forgotten his animosity to man. From all windows there shone forth the flickering lights of Myriad candles which adorned Christmas trees—the laughter of children could be heard and here and there radiant faces gazed out upon the lone pedestrian. Steunenberg, who was a splendid physical specimen, tall and strong; somewhat of an athlete, covering the mile between the town and his home in a quarter of an hour. Just as the clock of night fell softly over the quiet community, he reached a little by-path—

his favorite walk—which led to the back gate of his yard. Through the windows of his home he could see his wife and children grouped about the table—set for the evening meal—and awaiting his coming. In the kitchen a servant was bent over the stove. Arriving at the gate he opened it and entered. Being a man who kept things in an orderly way, he grasped the gate and drew it closed.

All Caldwell and the contiguous territory heard the terrific roar which followed. Momentarily the people were puzzled as to the cause of the explosion. There was no gas works explosion and no powder works. Perhaps it was the boiler of the electric plant or a freight engine. They rushed toward the scene, the sound faded. Along the way their ranks were swelled with excited, pale-faced helms. Hurrying further their steps were directed toward the Steunenberg place by some who resided nearby, and had located the sound. Finally they reached the spot. There lay what once had been a man—a sorry mass of shrunken flesh and bone. It was the body of the ill-fated former chief executive. The face was unharmed, but the limbs were torn and bleeding. The bones were pulverized. A wood splinter a foot and a half long was splintered into one of the arms. The trunk was pierced with countless bits of metal. There remained only the brain of an imbecile. With its vitality slowly ebbing out Steunenberg muttered incoherently. Finally life gushed out of the mangled frame with a convulsive shudder. Whatever the motive the deed was done—Frank Steunenberg lay dead, the victim of a cowardly assassin.

Fleet, as though winged, the dreadful news traveled. A special train from Boise brought the governor and friends of the murdered man. Groups little and great gathered to discuss the crime.

"Who did it?" asked every one. Suspicion attached to one Thomas Hogan, whose singular conduct during the week had made him the subject of much comment. He was a stranger. Now he had posed as an insurance agent, now as an itinerant seeking opportunity for investment.

Hogan was arrested by a posse led by Governor Gooding, and thrust into the Caldwell jail. Then it was remembered that Steunenberg, because of the rigid authority he had exercised over the offenders in the Coeur d'Alene mining troubles in 1899, had received letters threatening his life. Captain W. S. Swain, of the Thiele detective agency, with a score of operatives, was sent to Caldwell by the Mine Owners' Association. Swain said unequivocally that Hogan was the right man, and that he had been helped by Jack Stankins, of the executive committee of the Western Federation of Miners. Swain's work was impeded by a great many hostile detectives, who had been attracted to Caldwell by the offer of \$20,000, which had been offered as rewards. Those were finally withdrawn. Swain obtained a partial confession from Hogan, who admitted that his real name was Harry Orchard.

Fred Miller, of Spokane, who had served as an attorney in the Coeur d'Alene troubles, came to Caldwell to defend Orchard. This, together with the fact that Miller had communicated with Orchard before the latter had divulged his real name, tended to support the theory of Swain.

The Thiele men were unduly influenced off the case and the Pinkertons played in charge. Following an unsuccessful month during the appalling statement that Orchard had made a full confession, and then followed the disclosure of the disconcerting news of the report of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone on evidence furnished by Orchard.

Synopsis of the evidence pointed out that Jack Stankins, who had been suspected at the very outset, had been implicated in the murder. This ended the first chapter in this which will prove one of the greatest events in the annals of crime.
