SPRINKLING ORDINANCE IS PASSED

The city council got down to business last night and passed the street sprinkling ordinance with but one dissenting vote, that of George Fisher. The districts embraced in the ordinance are as follows:
District No. 1—Willamette street, from Sixth street to Eleventh.
District No. 2—Willamette street, from Eleventh street to Fifteenth street, Eleventh street from the alley west of Charnell street to Alder street; Pearl street, from the railroad track of the Southern Pacific railroad to Twelfth street; Eighth street, from Pearl to High street; High street, from Seventh to Eleventh street.
Cemetery Ordinance.
An ordinance forbidding the extension of the I. O. O. F. cemetery or of burying any dead body or of establishing any other cemetery inside the city limits was introduced and it was voted that it be made a special order for the next regular meeting of the council.

Other Matters.
A request of F. E. Dunn to erect a corrugated iron warehouse in the rear of his dry goods store was referred to the fire and water committee.

A remonstrance against opening Olive street south to West Seventeenth street was read and referred.
A request for an extra man to assist the chief of police in sidewalk repairs was referred to the mayor with power to act.

The billboard ordinance recently introduced was passed unanimously. It prohibits boards over seven feet high and provides for abating those already built which are higher.

An adjournment was taken until Monday evening, May 27.

VARSITY TEAM BEATS COLTS, 8 to 4

The varsity baseball team won from the McCormick Colts yesterday afternoon by the score of 8 to 4, by bunching hits on Pitcher Clifford, who had been loaned to the town team, in the first and second innings, and scoring then the eight runs which the college boys made. After the second inning Clifford changed his speed to slow balls, and only three hits were made off his delivery. The game as a whole was rather slow.

The Colts scored two tallies in the second chapter also. Headrick, who held down second base for the Colts, went to first on balls, and on a misplay by Paine went to third. Wistar Johnson then poked out a three-bagger, scoring the physical director. A minute later he came in on an error by Kelly, who caught for the varsity.

WANT IDAHO MARSHAL REMOVED FROM OFFICE

Moscow, Ida., May 15.—Counsel for defense thought to throw consternation upon the prosecution in the North Idaho land fraud conspiracy cases today by filing a motion asking for the removal of United States Marshal Rounds, of Boise, and his deputies, on the ground that they are prejudiced against the defendants and working too hard to assist the prosecution in securing conviction. Much feeling was expressed by counsel in arguing the motion, which also asked for an order against the secret service men.
This afternoon Judge Dietrich denied the application for a bill of particulars and overruled the demurrers to the two indictments. Through counsel the six defendants, only Robbott being present, entered pleas of not guilty to the two indictments returned at Boise. Judge Dietrich did not pass upon the motion to remove Rounds.
