## ABE RUEF'S DOWNFALL

Abe Ruef in his humiliating act of pleading guilty to a criminal charge states that he was honest until it became necessary to surrender his high ideals in order to build up and maintain a political machine. That is the rock upon which many an honest man has wrecked his honor and fortune.

Partisan politics has become a synonym for corruption. Organization and "machine" mean one and the same thing when applied to matters that pertain to the election of candidates for office, and it is this fact that is driving honest voters out of the political parties and causing them to act independently of the party leaders, or bosses. The principles of government for which the Democratic and Republican parties are popularly supposed to stand sponsor have been relegated to the background of late years and greed for office and the illegitimate spoils that official rings are able to plunder from the people are their chief attributes.

There is a lesson in the downfall of Abe Ruef that should have a salutary effect upon aspiring politicians. The people are thoroughly aroused at last, and that justice which "travels with leaden heel" but "strikes with iron hand" is dealing deadly blows upon those offenders who have so long disregarded her mandates.

The daily and weekly editions of the Guard are crowded with business nowadays—a true indication of the increasing business of the city and tributary country, as well as reflecting the confidence of the business interests in the Guard as a medium of publicity. This paper has always been recognized as the stand-by home paper of the upper Willamette valley, many subscribers on the list having taken it continuously for thirty-odd years. It gives the lie to the oft reiterated charge that Oregon people are "slow," and besides Roseburg is worthy of all the free advertising it will receive because of this widespread publicity.

Whether the man who said that Stephenson would gladly spend \$5,000,000 to get Spooner's seat, if there was any way to do it, was a wag, or was complimenting the Wisconsin legislature, we are not sure; but as a rule the man willing to spend money has little trouble in finding a way.

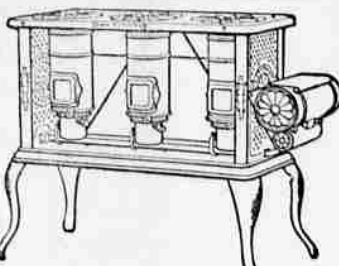

Engineer Carl Rankin and Force of Men Will Be Here Soon to Go to Work Again.

It is reported that Carl Rankin and his gang of surveyors, who quit work on the survey of the road across the mountains from Natron several months ago, will in a short time again resume the work of surveying the road across into Eastern Oregon, and are expected in Oregon any time to continue the work on the important job. When the crew quit it gave rise to all manner of speculation as to the abandonment of the project on account of numerous changes in railroad management and schemes, but the fact that the survey is to be continued means that the project has only been resting, and that it is really a permanent affair and that eventually a road will be run from this valley into Eastern Oregon by way of Eastern Lane county.—Albany Democrat.
