IRRIGATION ENGINEER IS HERE AGAIN

Arthur P. Stover, Connected With United States Agricultural Department and in Charge of Experimental Irrigation, in Eugene Will Combine Irrigation With Drainage.

Arthur P. Stover, irrigation engineer, connected with the office of experimental stations of the United States department of agriculture, who was in Eugene last fall for the purpose of selecting a site for experimental irrigation in Lane county, arrived here yesterday afternoon. In a short interview last evening he informed a Guard reporter that owing to existing labor conditions he has given up the plan of using the tract of land below the city in the vicinity of the Hensill farm as the site for the experiments in this vicinity. The agreement was that the land owners in the vicinity to be benefited by the irrigation were to furnish the labor, but owing to the scarcity of hands the farmers cannot well afford to spare the time themselves or allow their hired help to leave the farms long enough to be of any assistance to the irrigation work.

Mr. Stover, since he was here last, has been taken up with the idea of combined drainage and irrigation and is now looking for a tract of white land which now yields little or nothing on account of the lack of drainage. There is a good deal of such land in this county, and if a tract is found that is convenient to water a selection for experimental irrigation will be made at this time.

Mr. Stover drove out to see Y. L. Hensill at his farm below the city this morning to confer with him in regard to the matter and went to Albany this afternoon. He will be back, however, tonight, and remain several days in this city.

the charge that they had tried to influence the jury.

The trial was interrupted for an hour, prospective jurors and talesmen being excluded from the room during the discussion.

George Gribble was peremptorily challenged by the defense today, after he had been passed by both sides.

Bolae, May 16.—Harry Orchard, the prisoner-witness upon whom the state of Idaho chiefly relies to prove its charges that the inner circle of the Western Federation of Miners planned the conspiracy for the murder of Governor Steunenberg, broke his long silence today and for more than half an hour discussed himself and his imprisonment with the representative of the Associated Press whom he had expressed a desire to see.

Orchard said he had not been given any mistreatment during his confinement, denied that any force had been used to secure the statements made by him, and denied that Detective McFarland and officers of the state have promised him immunity for his confession of crime, or a reward for his alleged confession.

Orchard's manner and conversation during the interview tended strongly to confirm the assertion he had been converted to and is deep in the seal of the Christian religion. Two illustrations used by him to explain the kind of books he reads were Christian-like in character and religious in tone.

Orchard is perfectly sound and healthy in body, clear and quick of brain. If there was anything in the reports that he was breaking down in health and mind there is nothing now in his appearance or manner to give them a shadow of the truth.

"GET EVEN," BUT ALSO GET INTO TROUBLE

Douglas County Youths Destroy S. P. Property and Endanger Public Safety.

"We did it to get even on the S. P. Company," was the reason given by Peter Marketti, aged 19, and his cousin, Jacob Weller, aged 18, when arrested by Constable Jarvis at Alsea, near Comstock, Monday, on warrants charging them with tampering with and molesting railway signals and destroying railway property, says the Roseburg Review. They were arraigned before Justice Long, and held to the circuit court under bonds of \$500 each, in default of which they were committed to the county jail. Weller has made a written confession of guilt, implicating Marketti at the same time to Detective Reilly, of the Southern Pacific Company, who was instrumental in bringing about the arrest of the two young fellows.

Weller and Marketti have been working in a logging camp at Alsea, and previously they were employed as Southern Pacific section hands. Reduction in wages caused them to quit work for the railroad company, and they considered themselves aggrieved, for which they decided to "get even." Accordingly they smashed red lanterns placed alongside of the tracks at night as a warning to engineers to run slow, and tore down yellow flags hoisted for the same purpose in the day time. They also broke down fences, and sheds and buried ties and rolls of barbed wire into ditches. These depredations were carried on for a month before Weller and Marketti were detected. Weller was born near Perdue, this county, and Marketti is from Comstock. The charge of tampering with railway signals is a very serious one, as the statute provides penitentiary imprisonment for as long as ten years. For destroying personal property there is a maximum penalty of three years' imprisonment.
