Items of Interest Culled From Florence West - J. E. Barnes Very Ill - Schooner Alpha May Be Floated Soon - Mapleton Postoffice Turned Over to Morris.

Mr. Young has been assigned to duty in this section and will make his headquarters at Mapleton. He and the editor of this paper were classmates in college nearly 30 years ago.

It is reported that Mrs. John Latham, ex-postmistress at Samaria, is having difficulty with the government over business in connection with the postoffice. Mr. and Mrs. Latham sold their property at Samaria about two years ago, and the office was discontinued. The difficulty is over a transaction that occurred when they left.

STREET SPRINKLERS TAKE NOTICE.
