THE GALVESTON PLAN.

Lewiston, Idaho, is the first town in the West to take up what is known as the Galveston plan of city government, says the Seattle Star.

Following the great hurricane and tidal wave, which almost destroyed Galveston in 1900, the people went before the legislature and had the city charter abolished and a new form of government substituted, consisting of five men, each of whom, besides performing duty as councilmen, fill executive offices of the city. The idea is said to have been copied from a plan adopted by Memphis, following the cholera epidemic of 1875 but material changes and modifications were made by Galveston.

Lewiston, Idaho, has grown very rapidly in the last six years, and is now a city of about 7000 inhabitants. Recently a new charter was adopted, which went into effect recently. This new charter completely changes the old recognized form of government of the city directly into the hands of the people.

It provides for the initiative and referendum, the recall, and gives the city the right to own and construct public utilities of all sorts and empowers the city authorities to fix and regulate the price for gas, light and street car fares.

There are six councilmen, who with the mayor exercise all legislative functions and each of whom fill some one of the executive offices of the city. All are elected at large thus doing away with the ward councilman. One councilman is police commissioner, his pay being for his double duties of legislator for the city and the head of the police department. In the same way another councilman will be fire commissioner, the third will be street commissioner, the fourth commissioner of public works, the fifth the water works and sewer commissioner, and the sixth the commissioner of finance and revenue. Because they are not elected by wards it is possible to pick the best material for each place.

Franchises may be granted limited to a life of 25 years, after which they may be acquired by the city at a fair valuation for the tangible property, no allowance whatever to be made for any value derived through the franchise. Public service corporations are forbidden to in any way contribute to campaign funds, and 25 per cent of the voters petitioning at any time may demand a recall of any official not performing his duties satisfactorily to the people.

While it is an innovation Lewiston's charter provides for the running of the city on such practical lines that its operation will be watched with the greatest of interest all over the United States.

It is high time that the Willamette Valley Company was doing some actual construction work on the street car line. Even if operations are begun at once and pushed as rapidly as possible it is doubtful if the company will be able to comply with the terms of its franchise and have the line in operation to Springfield by January 1. The building of the river bridge alone, toward which no move has yet been made, will be a big, slow piece of work, and it will no doubt take several months to lay the track, string the wires and put the line in running order. Seven or eight months have elapsed since the franchise was granted and the people have waited patiently, with little insistence, for the beginning of work, and a substantial guarantee of good faith is now due from the company.

Every newspaperman in Oregon is a delegate-at-large to the Oregon Development League meetings. The president and secretary of every commercial, industrial, irrigation and horticultural organization in Oregon is a delegate, and the president has the right to name such delegates as he desires. Every county judge in the state is a delegate and has authority to name two others, and the same is true in regard to the mayors of the cities and towns. Oregon must get full benefit of the colonist rates during September and October, and one of the chief features of the convention will be a discussion upon the lines of how we are going to get the best out of this great Northwest travel. There will be a number of good speakers present and questions vital to the development of this state will be discussed, but the central idea of the gathering will be how to make practical and effective the work of modern advertising; in other words, the best possible plan upon which we can work in harmony to add to the population and wealth of Oregon.

The next convention will be held in Portland June 21-22.
