NEW BUILDING PLANNED FOR DIVINITY SCHOOL

Will Not Be Erected This Year But Will Be Necessary Next Year. Regents of School Re-elect Old Faculty and Create New Department

At the annual meeting of the board of regents of the Eugene Divinity School, held at the residence of Dean Eugene C. Sanderson yesterday afternoon, the matter of erecting an additional building for the school, which has been under consideration for some time past, was discussed. While it has been practically agreed that a new building is necessary to take care of the rapid increase in students at the school, it will probably not be erected this year, although it is thought that next year will see the present plans of the regents in that respect consummated. The board ordered numerous improvements in the present school building, in the way of readjusting some of the rooms so that there will be more floor space.

Teachers Selected.

The board retained the old board of teachers and created a new department, that of art. Mrs. Frederic Brooke will be at the head of the new department. Mrs. D. C. Kellems was appointed as assistant in the department of oratory, this also being a new position. Another new department which has just been added is that of vocal music. Professor Jesse Davis, of Worcester, Mass., being at the head of it. This department was established for the purpose of training evangelistic singers. The other members of the faculty are: E. C. Wigmore, D. C. Kellems, J. M. Morris and Mrs. Ella Humbert, besides the dean.

Alumni Meeting.

The alumni association of the school met at the home of the dean after the regents' meeting and spent a very profitable and enjoyable hour. The association is only a year old, but the attendance was large. Plans for the coming year were laid and future meetings were arranged for.

Graduating Exercises.

The graduating exercises at the Christian church last night were attended by a very large audience, the building being crowded. The address of the occasion was delivered by Rev. W. A. Moore, of Tacoma, who spoke at length in a very eloquent manner. President Campbell, of the university, also delivered an address to the class and Dean Sanderson conferred the degrees upon the graduates, who are: Karl Berg, Mrs. Ella Humbert, George Roach Whipple, Frederick M. Brooke and Lulu Kellems.
