Fortnightly Club Arranging for Band Concert There Friday Evening, May 24.

The tract of land just across the river, owned by the county, has this spring been reserved by the county court as a pleasure resort. Hitherto the spot, while possessing every natural attraction, has been employed as a dumping ground for rubbish and a camping ground for the gypsies. The ladies of the Fortnightly Club seeing in it great possibilities and believing the citizens of Eugene more entitled to its charm than wandering gypsy bands, secured the grant from the court. Since then the lively interest taken by different individuals and organizations in its improvement has amply justified the effort made to secure it. By the generous help of the high school boys the ground has been cleared of rubbish, the grease wood and other brush grubbed out. A pump, table and benches now make it a convenient spot for picnickers and pleasure seekers. The whole has been enclosed within a fence, thus making it inaccessible to vagrants.

That the people of Eugene may see for themselves what it will mean to the city to have this park, the concert Friday night has been arranged. It is not to be understood that the park is complete. Many improvements have yet to be perfected. More cleaning and grading will be done, swings and other conveniences will be added. In the meantime it is hoped the people will take advantage of what attractions it already has. Come and see Friday night what they are.

COTTAGE GROVE STIRRED TO ACTION

Cottage Grove, May 21.—Smarting under the continued car shortage at this place by which the local lumber industry is completely paralyzed the Commercial Club at its meeting Monday night turned its whole attention to the transportation problem.

The situation was fully discussed and a movement inaugurated looking to the building of a railroad from Portland to Roseburg via the Coast fork to connect with the proposed road from Roseburg to Marshfield and for which Douglas and Coos counties have already subscribed over \$200,000.

A committee of three, consisting of A. L. Woodward, T. D. Wheeler and D. M. C. Gault was appointed to confer with like committees from all commercial clubs along the proposed route, the Western Oregon Lumber Manufacturers' Association and the Oregon and Washington Association.

The call is for all these committees to meet at Cottage Grove in the Commercial club rooms on June 25 to devise ways and means for the construction of such a road in order to relieve the transportation situation throughout the valley.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS IN BRIEVITY FORM

At Claxton, Ga., yesterday, while attempting to capture a negro, a mob of whites were fired upon by a crowd of negroes in a house they had surrounded. One man was killed and several wounded. The mob retired but later returned and lynched the negro owner of the house, Sam Padgett, and daughter, aged ten years.

At Wallawa, Oregon, the jury in the case of James Morris, Jr., charged with the murder of Charles G. Simms on the porch of the Hotel Haun in Lostine on the evening of October 21 last, brought in a verdict of manslaughter Saturday night, after being out nearly five hours. The defendant regards the verdict as a compromise and will appeal.

The state land board yesterday decided to stand by its act cancelling state land certificates held by A. T. Kelliher, covering some 30,000 acres, and next week, after the new law goes into effect, the board will repay to Kelliher the portion of the purchase price already paid, and then advertise the lands for sale to the highest bidder in tracts of not to exceed 320 acres.

A. L. Brown, of Salem, who was yesterday elected grand chief ranger of the Foresters of America for Oregon at the annual meeting of the grand court at Ranier, has for many years been a prominent member of the order. He has lived in the Capital City for nearly 30 years and for 20 years has been superintendent of the Salem Water Works.
