DEPUTY SHEEP INSPECTORS APPOINTED

Official Here and Says Dipping Law Will Be Enforced, Notwithstanding Reports to Contrary -- Willamette Valley Bucks Best in World.

R. O. Whitbeck has been appointed deputy state sheep inspector for the precincts of Wendling and Mohawk, in Lane county, by State Sheep Inspector Lytle, and it is probable that A. J. Pickard, of Eugene, will also be appointed for a portion of the county within a few days.

The state and federal inspectors are determined to enforce the new law in regard to dipping in Lane county, notwithstanding reports to the contrary. An official was here yesterday looking into the matter and was interviewed by a Guard representative last night. He desired that portions of the dipping law be quoted for the benefit of raisers of sheep as follows:

From Section 8—"It shall be the duty of the state sheep inspector upon the request of any recognized wool growers' association within the state or upon the request of any five sheep owners of any county to appoint a deputy inspector for any county or any locality therein."

From Section 11—"All sheep within this state are required to be dipped at least once during each year with some standard dip, whether the same at the time are diseased or not."

From Section 16—"If any owner or person in charge of any sheep shall neglect or refuse to dip the same as required by the terms of this act, upon the request of the state sheep inspector or any of his deputies or any federal official clothed with power under this act, or to permit the same to be dipped by them, it shall be the duty of such official to seize such animals and dip the same and he is hereby given authority to do so."

Cost Not Excessive.

In the interview the official said: "Where there is a community having sheep in considerable numbers they can petition the state sheep inspector to have a man appointed deputy for that district who can, with the sheep owners, make arrangements that will be mutually agreeable for the dipping of the sheep in that locality without excessive cost for inspector's fees. In all cases, however, when such community arrangements are made the first dipping of any

kind or the first preparation of any medicine for dipping by the inspector should be deferred until such a time as a representative of the federal government could be present with him to insure his following the prescribed methods for the work.

Erroneous Report.

"It is unfortunate," said the official, "that an erroneous idea regarding enforcement of the annual dipping for this year has been allowed to have such a general spread. The attitude Lane county has been reported to have taken on this question has retarded the movement to nearly every other county in the valley. It is not intended that the law should work a hardship upon anybody, but rather that it should be a benefit to every raiser of sheep, and it is enforced and Oregon as a state removed from the federal quarantine which it now suffers. It will be of incalculable benefit not only to the sheep men in the range districts of Eastern Oregon, but even in a far greater measure to the sheep raisers of the Willamette valley to whom Eastern Oregon itself, Wyoming, Idaho, Washington, Montana, the Dakotas and even Colorado and Nevada are looking for their bucks of the coarse wool type, which is conceded by all the best in the world."

Valley Bucks Best.

"Last year all the statistics mentioned were represented in the Willamette valley by buyers who left with only one-tenth of the number of bucks they wanted. This year over 5000 bucks have been contracted for from this valley for delivery among the sheep owners of the states mentioned, and the only complaint these buyers have to make is the fact that before they can move the bucks out of the state the United States department of agriculture requires them to be dipped, and because of this fact the government requirement for dipping before they can be shipped to another state, the states themselves to which these sheep are destined, through their livestock sanitary board, require that the poor animals be again dipped before being turned loose upon the range. But in spite of this dipping the Willamette valley bucks still maintain their reputation for greater size, better mutton and heavier fleeces than the bucks of any other region the world can produce."

A Dipping Formula.

A standard dipping formula, as furnished by the official to Deputy Inspector Whitbeck, is as follows: To make lime and sulphur the formula is: Eight pounds of lime and twenty-four pounds of sulphur to 100 gallons of water, boiled two hours. To make it follow this plan have a boiler that will hold 100 gallons of water without boiling over. Get this water boiling. Have an empty barrel and put twenty-four pounds of lime chunks in it. Then put 72 pounds of sulphur over it. Pour fifteen gallons of your boiling water in on top of this and stir it with a shovel. After it has stopped bubbling pour it into your boiler and boil for two hours. Use one gallon of this to two gallons of water to make three gallons of dip.

UNIVERSITY IS NOT LOCAL INSTITUTION

Because the Morning Register calls the University of Oregon, the University of Eugene a good part of the student body are slightly weary, and it has been suggested that a petition be sent to the state to have the publication cease the expression. This will probably be done if the paper should persist in using the appellation.

The students claim that there are no grounds for the use of "Eugene," as Oregon does not draw and her students from this city. These Eugene is not representative of the student body at all, and particularly by those members most active in student body affairs, for it is those whose homes are at a distance that hold the most prominent places in university life. Besides, the college draws its support from the state.

The students who protest against the name think that it is a narrow spirit, which if it should spread over the entire state, would work to the detriment of the institution. The suggestion to quit calling the university merely U. O. is receiving the heartiest support among both instructors and students, but the appellation University of Eugene brings out only anger and disgust.

Portland Market Report.

Portland, Or., May 23.—"The 1907 hop crop of Oregon and Washington will be at least 20,000 bales less than that of last year," said one of the leading hop dealers of the city today, after an investigation covering several weeks of the condition of the hop fields of this state and Washington. "The shortage may be even greater than that," he continued, "for the fields are getting far from the attention they had heretofore. Cultivation in all parts of the hop districts of this state and Washington is slack this year and a good many fields have been plowed up and planted to other crops by disgruntled ex-hopgrowers."

"For this condition of things the present low price is, of course, responsible. There is now a fairly strong demand in the East for hops at 5 to 7 cents a pound, and sales are being made daily at these figures, but there is very little free selling on the part of growers, for the producers are naturally averse to selling hops that cost ten cents for five. We have to tell them that five cents a pound is better than a total loss, and taking this view of the situation the growers are parting with their crops."

"The indications are that the 1906 crop will be disposed of before the arrival of the new crop. While it is very early to estimate the size of the 1907 yield, it can be safely said that California's product, as well as that of Oregon and Washington, will be below the average, and from all information at hand it looks as if the entire American hop product this year will be materially under the normal. Little will be known regarding the outlook in the hop growing centers of Europe before the middle of June."

First Wool Sales.

The first wool sales of the season in this state will be conducted today at Pendleton. A large amount of wool will be offered, and although sentiment has been against the sale of stock at any figure under the price obtained a year ago, it is thought that values offered will be satisfactory and the sales will be a good success. However, all over the country the wool growers are aroused over the subject of lower prices and combinations are being formed among producers on every side. The latest plan now before the growers is for them to organize a sort of national trust. Although plans for this organization have been talked of before, this time definite in the scope of the association has not been settled.

Some propose that all wool growers get together in their own states and organize a state association from which delegates will be sent for the
