TEACHERS AND SALARIES

It begins to look as if Eugene would find it necessary to pay better salaries for teachers or accept the alternative of second-class ability. Nearly every day some good teacher gives up a position in our schools to go elsewhere upon the inducement of better pay. The result is that the city's schools next year in several departments will be in charge of new and untried teachers. In the place of those whose qualifications are well known and whose services proved highly satisfactory.

Good teachers are in greater demand than ever in the West, and it is but reasonable to expect, when prices and salaries have been advanced all along the line, that it should cost more than formerly to procure men and women to take charge of our schools. It is a situation that the board will have to confront with careful judgment, having ever in mind the welfare of our schools, which stand as high as those of any in the state at the present time, as well as exercising due regard for the interests of the taxpayers.

Now is an excellent time to have the hay crop along the residence streets of town cut. While the street commissioner is looking after the sidewalks he might hint to property owners that the greatest improvement they could make for little expense would be to have the grass along the streets adjacent to their property cut regularly.

The salaries paid in the public schools of Salem are as follows: City School Superintendent J. M. Powers, \$1500; E. T. Mariatte, principal of the high school, \$120 per month; Barry Eastham, instructor in science, \$90; high school teachers, \$70; all grade teachers will begin at \$50 per month and get \$60 after the second year.

An old civil war law has just been unearthed which authorizes the president, in his discretion, to jump senior naval officers in selecting squadron and fleet commanders.
