APPLICANTS FOR RAILROAD LANDS INCREASE

Refusal of S. P. Co. to Accept Money Offered by Lane County People Has Not Affected Interest In Movement - 80,000 Acres In This County Covered by Application

The refusal of the Southern Pacific to accept the money offered by Lane county people for railroad lands has not affected the interest in the movement here, nor caused any considerable abatement in the line of applicants for timber lands at \$2.50 per acre. In the neighborhood of 500 applications have been made from this county, and the interest in the outlying districts is as great now as it was in the towns a few days ago.

Probably 80,000 acres of land in Lane county have been covered by the applications, and it is likely that in a few weeks the most valuable timber claims will be covered. The attorneys sent to San Francisco were uniformly refused in their offer, an action that everybody expected, but this has not discouraged the people. Applications are coming in from other parts of Oregon from those who know the splendid timber owned by the railroad in Lane county. People here feel that it may be two or three years before the matter is settled in the courts, but they do not seem to mind waiting that long for a decision that will make some of them independent.

A good feature of the work of locating applicants here has been that the companies and organizations have been working in different timber belts and it is not likely that many locations have been duplicated.

NO LAUNCHES ALLOWED IN THE MILL RACE

Some Property Owners Claim Waves Made by Propellers Injure Their Land—Boat Club Will Erect House on Mrs. Cundiff's Property.

Some of the property owners along the millrace have made an objection to the operation of gasoline launches in the race for the alleged reason that the waves made by the propellers of the boats have a tendency to wash away the banks of the race. It is said that recently when one of the gasoline launches attempted to ascend the race, as it reached a point a short distance above the university a man stood on the bank with a shotgun and ordered that the boat go no farther. On account of this attitude on the part of a few of the people along the race, the owners of launches have been compelled to take them to the river. There has been no great objection on the part of the launch owners to this, however, as it is a very difficult matter to operate them in the race. It takes the combined efforts of two men to keep the boats from running into the banks of the race, as the stream is very narrow.

Will Build Club House. There is no objection to the operation of canoes and rowboats on the race, and the recent stand taken by some of the people along the stream has no effect upon the success of the newly-organized boat club. The club will go ahead with the erection of a club house and boat houses and will continue to meet regularly and enjoy the summer's boating. Arrangements are now being made for the erection of a house on Mrs. Cundiff's property on the banks of the race near Patterson street. The idea of utilizing the old Dillard property on East Eleventh street has been given up since the property changed hands recently. The new building will be complete in every detail and will cost \$200 or \$400. It will be small, but nevertheless convenient and cozy.

DEZDEK AND PATTERSON UPSET IN SWIFT RAPIDS

Hugo Dezdek, physical director at the university, and Joe Patterson, a student from Pittsburg, Pa., while shooting the rapids in the river at Judkins' Point, in a canoe, yesterday afternoon, were overturned in the seething waters and would perhaps have drowned had they not both been excellent swimmers.

They made the start in good shape and were making good headway down the narrow channel where the water is little less than a cataract, when their frail craft struck a huge boulder and capsized. Both men sank from sight beneath the swirling waters, and bystanders who witnessed the accident thought sure that they were drowned. But within a minute their heads appeared above the surface of the water and with giant-like strokes they set out for the shore. Patterson being the better swimmer, reached the bank first, and seeing his companion struggling with the waves, plunged in again and helped him to the shore. They both then waded out a few feet and pulled the boat to shore and seeing Dezdek's hat floating on the water, Patterson swam out and rescued it. Patterson is said to be one of the best swimmers on the coast, and had it not been for this fact we might have been compelled to chronicle a drowning and possibly two. Dezdek himself is an accomplished swimmer, but could not keep up with Patterson in the race for the shore.
