MEMORIAL

SERMON BY REV.

D. H. TRIMBLE

Delivered at Methodist Church Sunday Morning Before G. A. R. and the Kindred Organizations.
"Hitherto Hath the Lord Helped Us," Was the Text

Sunday forenoon the G. A. R., the W. R. C., the Ladies of the G. A. R. and the Sons of Veterans attended the services at the Methodist church in a body and listened to the annual memorial sermon by Rev. D. H. Trimble. The church was packed. The exercises were interesting, there being special music for the occasion and the interior of the church was decorated. Rev. Mr. Trimble's text was from First Samuel 7-12, "Hitherto hath the Lord Helped Us." He said in part:

"The setting up of the stone upon which was the inscription of our text, marked a crisis in the history of a nation.

"By God's direct intervention, the nation Israel had been saved from her enemies. Through 999 years of history Providence had cleared their path. It marked also a promise of blessing and usefulness to a righteous and obedient people. God had been manifestly in the history. Has He not been in ours? One hundred and thirty-nine years old the fourth of July next, the youngest of the great nations, we stand first in world influence, in wealth, in moral civilization. God was with our fathers, who landed upon the Plymouth Rock, in that fearful struggle of the Revolution, in the no less critical period which immediately followed out of whose travail came the United States Constitution.

"Ours was an unprecedented development from 1783 to 1860. We advanced by leaps and bounds and reached the foremost place among the nations. But we were guilty before God through all these years of a mortal sin. Human slavery, that political leprosy, had fastened itself upon the body politic and was eating through flesh and bone to the vitals of that independence for which our fathers fought and died. Our boasted liberty had but half a meaning. Slavery had evaded the Declaration and the Constitution and, like a viper in the bosom, a cherished institution in the South, it was preparing for a deadly spring at the life of the Union.

"With the election of Lincoln came the secession of the South. The firing on the flag at Sumter struck to the heart of the North like an electric shock and the volunteers of America took the field. Then it was that this country atoned for her sins. Sins of omission on the part of the North, sins of commission on the part of the South.

"Both North and South underestimated the other's powers. To the North it was to be a noon spell, and three months would end the war. One Southerner could match ten Northerners at the beginning of the war. But before the awful conflict was over each had developed a whole new respect for the other. The cost in the concrete was nearly a million men dead upon both sides and more than five billion of money. One quarter of all the values of the nation at that time. So great a price in blood and treasure did you pay for national unity. The sacrifice was justified only on the principle that no sacrifice is too great to make for one's fellows, if the world is lifted towards truth.

"The results of the war were the freedom of the slave, the verification of the constitution—that all men were created free, the exaltation of liberty, a purer patriotism, national unity and more profound respect for our national institutions. These are the laurels that rest upon your arms.

"The rights and liberties for which you fought are worthy of preservation still, the enemies are still within our borders, the conflict must still be waged. Last year it cost us \$1,500,000,000 more that the expense of any single year of the civil war, one hundred thousand of our fellows were killed, God only knows how many men, women and children were wounded. Your comrades went from the field of battle to the crown of glory; those from the gutter and the tremors to the deeper depths of the drunkards' hell. The bulwark of this whole nefarious business is the moderate drinker. From him the immoderate drinkers have developed and through him the habit has commended itself to others. Shall we sacrifice the tickling of our moderate drinking palates for the saving of these 100,000 comrades.

"The statistics of another conflict are to be had. If so they would be more appalling still. The social evil, the red light district in our cities, clandestine relations in our seemingly innocent communities. If the doctors and the lawyers were to tell all they knew it would set the community by the ears. Let us learn the lesson from the downfall of Rome and Greece, the decadence of France, the defeat of Russia upon the plains of Manchuria. Wickedness is weakness, but purity is power.

"The flagrant violation of some laws, which leads to contempt for all law, is a danger that besets us. We consider ourselves still on guard. We challenge every one who seeks admission to places of public trust. He must give the countersign known only to those whom virtue exalts and character crowns. We must preserve by the ballot what you have won by the bayonet.

"God will help us so long as we are true to righteousness. He deserts us the moment we swerve from that path."
