LET US PULL TOGETHER

Now that the Eugene-Corvallis canal project has been passed up as too expensive an undertaking for the people of the upper Willamette valley to carry out, there should be a definite move made in some other direction that promises to solve the transportation problem. An electric or steam railroad could no doubt be built to Siuslaw tidewater if it were taken up in a determined, business-like manner after the example set by Roseburg and Marshfield. Either of two plans might be successfully carried out.

A company might be incorporated by well-known local business men, and stock subscriptions made in Lane county for a large part of the issue, bonds being sold after the money raised from stock subscriptions was exhausted. Or, after the company has been launched, bonds might be issued at once in small denominations after the fashion of a popular loan, and there is no doubt but a large amount would be taken locally. With such an evidence of good will and interest in the enterprise given by our people the remainder of the issue would be eagerly sought for by outside investors. Either of these plans we believe would be enthusiastically received by the people of Lane county, guaranteeing the absolute success of the enterprise.

One thing more should be done without further loss of time—a persistent and persevering effort to secure the opening of the upper Willamette river to navigation as far as Eugene. This will entail no expense upon the people, further than the raising of funds for incidental expenses in bringing the matter to the attention of congress, and that should not be heavy, since the services of the Oregon delegation might easily be enlisted in behalf of such a large body of their constituents. Those best acquainted with the river are positive that the opening of the stream is entirely feasible, and that it would not be an expensive undertaking from the government standpoint.

Let Lane county people get together and stay united until some definite plan of relief has been carried out to a successful conclusion.

During the past three years Superintendent Arnold has established the custom of having a baccalaureate sermon delivered before the high school graduating class. In the higher institutions this has long been done, but it was not the practice in city schools until Mr. Arnold took charge, and it has proven a highly acceptable innovation to all concerned. Last night at the Methodist church the audience crowded every available inch of space in the large building, as an evidence of the interest shown in the exercises, which consisted of a special musical program and the sermon by Rev. H. N. Mount, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church. This sermon was a scholarly effort, replete with oratorical gems, but valuable more for its original thought and forcible application of scriptural lessons to the problems of the present time. It was an address that will long be remembered by the students whose attention was riveted upon the speaker and his utterances by the circumstance of being special auditors, and the influence it will exert over their future lives must be productive only of good. Seed thus sown never falls upon unproductive ground.

One of the city drays was smashed up by a locomotive at the S. P. freight depot Saturday evening, a serious accident being narrowly averted. It is a wonder the way the drays are arranged in the limited space between tracks, where the transfer

teams are compelled to stand loading and unloading, that accidents have been infrequent in the past and it is only a question of time when a tragedy will be enacted there that will cause general public indignation. It seems as if there should be some way to force a corporation like the Southern Pacific to make at least ordinary provisions for the safety of their patrons, and that there should be some legal way of abating the death trap maintained at the freight depot in this city. If the city council is powerless in the premises the attention of the district attorney or the next grand jury should be called to it.

Judging from some of our Virginia exchanges, the contest for the democratic nomination to fill a vacancy in congress, from that state, is being fought on the question of what to do with the Philippines. A fat lot the man chosen will have to say about that in congress, won't he?

Official denial of the story alleging that members of "swell society" invited into the visiting duke's quarters, on his flagship, swiped his toilet articles and the buttons off his uniforms, for souvenirs, eases the international strain some.

Very Small Business.

Invoking the referendum on the State University appropriation of \$125,000 with which to maintain it and properly equip it for the work it must do as the leading educational institution of the state looks rather small business when the fact is considered that the Missouri legislature has just appropriated \$100,000 for the erection of one building alone at the State University of that state. Oregon is a great state, but Missouri can show her some things yet when it comes to the building up and maintaining of educational institutions that are a credit to the state. The value of the grounds, building and equipment of the University of Missouri is estimated at \$2,000,000. The growth of the university has been marvelous until at present it is credited with being the most rapidly growing university in the United States. Missouri is also credited with a splendid system of well sustained public schools, so that it appears to be an unprejudiced mind that the two institutions go together, and the building up of one encourages and builds up the other.

OREGON NEWS

With over a million pounds of wool offered at the public sales, and with 647,071 pounds sold, the sales closed yesterday with much satisfaction to the growers, who received a better price than they had hoped for. The sheepmen give credit to the Idaho buyers for the high prices which prevailed. Prices ranged from 18 1/2 to 22 cents.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

College Expenditures.

(Springfield (Mass.) Republican.) Under the direction of the regents some statistics have recently been prepared comparing the expenses of Michigan with those of the other great universities in the country. The amount of instruction furnished one student during one week is taken as the basis of computation and the unit is called a "student week." This method, therefore, does not take into consideration the actual number of students, but only the amount of instruction given. Upon this basis the figures are 154,938 student weeks for Harvard as against 152,826 for Michigan. Columbia is next with 150,729 student weeks, then Illinois with 137,718, and Cornell, 131,176. The total expenditures of these different universities differed widely, however. Harvard spent \$1,607,034.89, while Michigan's budget called for but \$583,845.15. Wisconsin, with only 122,625 student weeks, spent \$411,548.53, and Illinois' expenditures, with 155,000 student weeks less than Michigan, were \$1,059,363. Computed on a basis of cost per student week, it is found that Harvard spends \$10.37 a week for one student, Cornell spends \$8.79, Chicago \$8.69, Yale \$7.94, Illinois \$7.59, Wisconsin, \$6.86, Missouri \$6.33, Ohio \$5.46, Kansas \$4.13, and Michigan only \$3.82. Of all the larger Western universities Indiana, Minnesota, Nebraska and Iowa also spend less than Michigan, and but a very little less, except in the case of Indiana, where the cost is only \$3.08 per student week. Minnesota is at present asking for an aggregate appropriation of \$1,500,000 and Wisconsin for an annual total income of \$1,207,000. Illinois is asking for \$3,347,500, or a one-mill bill. Michigan at present receives from the state but \$442,000.
