Among the equipment are 130 teams, most of them working in South Portland and between Tualatin and Wilsonville. In about two weeks the company will renew work north of Chehewa. Steel is being laid in South Portland as fast as the grade is ready for it, and the last spike on the Tualatin-Wilsonville section will be driven shortly.—Evening Telegram.

RAILWAY PEOPLE WILL NOT DELAY PAVING WORK

E. W. Hall Says Willamette Valley Co. Will Be Ready to Lay Rails on Willamette Street as Soon as Paving People Are Ready for Them

E. W. Hall, of the Willamette Valley Company, is up from Portland looking after the company's affairs in this city. In a short interview this afternoon he informed a Guard reporter that his company will be ready to lay the street railway tracks just as soon as the paving people reach a point in their work that will enable them to begin laying the rails, which will be here at once. Mr. Hall understood in Portland yesterday that they had already arrived here, but upon his arrival found that they had been delayed somewhere. It will be some time yet, however, before the rails are needed, as the paving company has to do a lot of grading and other work on the street before they can be put down.

Setting up Paving Plant. The remainder of the paving plant was unloaded from the freight cars at the empty lot just east of the Eugene planing mill today, and the rock crusher will soon be in operation. W. L. Archambault, president of the Warren Construction Company, is here from Portland looking after the beginning of the paving work. He is well satisfied with the outlook for a successful job on Willamette street.

DEATH OF LEWIS HOLSANDSWORTH

Former Lane County Young Man Dies at Calexico On May 19. Leaves a Number of Relatives Here

The following, from the Calexico, Cal., Chronicle, tells of the death of a former Lane county resident:

"Lewis Holsandsworth, for four years a resident of Calexico, Cal., and well-known over the entire valley, died Sunday evening at 9:45 o'clock May 19, at the home of his sister, Mrs. Emerson, at Calexico. He had been ill for some time, although the end did not seem so near to relatives and friends.

"He was the second son of Mr. and Mrs. William Holsandsworth, and was born at Palouse City, Washington, June 23, 1878, and would have been twenty-nine years of age at his next birthday.

"He removed with his parents when nine years of age to Lane county, Oregon, where he lived to young manhood. He had since spent three years in Cottonwood, Idaho, and four years ago he removed to the Imperial valley, where he conducted a livery business for two years. The remainder of the time here he spent in the employ of the California-Mexico Land & Cattle Company as foreman and traveling agent.

"His residence here had made him many friends, who without exception mourn his untimely demise. He leaves two sisters here, Mrs. Mary Emerson and Mrs. R. J. Hayes. One sister died in Calexico two years ago and in Idaho he has a brother, James R. Holsandsworth, and Mrs. Anna May, a sister, in Oregon one brother, two sisters and a mother survive him.

"The remains were accompanied to Imperial for burial Tuesday by a train load of friends after a service under the auspices of the Christian Science church, of which he was a true believer here, and many times in his last days he expressed his complete faith in God and that his peace with Him was complete.

"The services at Imperial, at the request of the family, were in charge of the L. O. O. F., of which he was a member at Cottonwood, Idaho. There being no lodge in Calexico, R. L. Conklin was appointed to act as noble grand and Rev. R. L. Glasby as chaplain from resident members.

"At the grave the beautiful and impressive service of the Odd Fellows was carried out, after which he was laid to rest by the side of his youngest sister. The many beautiful flowers that banked both casket and grave spoke volumes for the high esteem of the dead. At the grave a choir composed of Rev. and Mrs. Glasby, R. L. Conklin and Mrs. Wright sang two familiar hymns selected by the family."

TRACK TEAM LEAVES FOR SEATTLE MEET

University of Oregon Athletes, Twelve in Number, Off Today to Sound City to Compete in Tri-State Meet. Hayward Develops Champion Team

The University of Oregon track team left today for the big inter-state triangular track meet on May 30 at Seattle with the Universities of Washington and Idaho. Twelve men were taken. They are Moores, Kuykendall, Kelly, Moulton, Oberhauser, Flux, Zacharias, McKinney, Wood, Reid, Dodson and Huston.

The men are in fine shape, and although the closeness of the O. A. C. meet and the triangular meet may bother the men a little, they should keep their pace of breaking records. It is very likely that the shot put or the hammer throw or discus throw records will receive another push. It is also possible that Kelly will give the world a new mark, but Captain Moores is more likely to establish another record in the 220-yard hurdles.

The real contest in the meet is not which team will win, but whether Oregon will win more points than both Washington and Idaho combined. The Pullman men said that they could, but Pullman is probably a little prejudiced, and feels "bitter" toward Oregon than the other two institutions.

Hayward a Great Trainer.

Oregon has been hailed by the newspapers as having the best track team in the United States. Of course all Oregon students support this statement heartily, but they wonder how it is. The answer seems to be in her trainer. Hayward three or four years ago was not nearly as he is now. In every meet he learns much. He is who has made the Oregon sprinters, weight men and hurdlers. His productions in the distance runs have not been so creditable, but they are good. This year he has good men in the half and quarter, but the mile is very weak. In the past the sprinters and weight men have surpassed the distance men, though a good many points have been won in the long runs.

FAVORABLE WEATHER DURING PAST WEEK

Showers and Cool Weather First Part of Week, But Warmer During Latter Part—Some Fog in Portions of the State.

Following are portions of the regular bulletin sent out from the weather bureau at Portland on Oregon climate conditions for the week ending Monday, May 27:

General Summary. The past week, on the whole, was very favorable. Good rains fell on three days in southern Oregon and in the southern coast counties. Elsewhere there was a light fall of rain in scattered places on one day, and the weather generally averaged below normal everywhere except in the Willamette valley, where it was warmer than usual, both during the daytime and at night. The early part of the week was the coolest and the last two days were the warmest. Light frosts occurred in some of the eastern counties on the 21st and 22nd, but they did no harm of consequence. Notwithstanding the sunshine was deficient and there was considerable fog in the coast cities, the afternoons, as a rule, were mild and pleasant.

Willamette Valley. Portland, Multnomah county—A light rain fell during the early part of the week, after which fair weather prevailed. There was abundant sunshine. The temperature averaged three degrees above normal, being about normal until the last two days, when it became much warmer.

Salem, Marion county—The first of the week was cloudy, with showers, while the latter part was clear, with rising temperatures.

Corvallis, Benton county—Tuesday and Wednesday were partly cloudy, with light showers. From Thursday until Saturday it was clear, with temperatures about normal. No frost occurred and there were no high winds. It has been an ideal week. Welches, Clackamas county—The fore part of the week was sultry and cloudy. A violent and lightning storm occurred on Wednesday evening. The last two days were cloudy, with light showers.

REGISTER TELLS HOW DWYER GOT CLAIMS

Moscow, Idaho, May 27.—E. H. Bartlett, register of the Lewiston land office, was the only witness in the land fraud cases this morning, and at noon had not finished his direct testimony. By this witness the prosecution expects to prove that the defendants conspired to obtain title to much timber land in a contiguous body. The witness showed by the records of the land office that Defendant Dwyer had instituted about 24 contests against the claims of individuals and when he would win a contest the land would be either scripped or filed upon by some one for him, and after proof would be turned over to Ketterbach and Keister. A mass of evidence of this character was brought out by this witness.
