## SELECTING A JURY

In these times of great (?) criminal trials it is almost absolutely necessary for newspaper readers to understand legal expressions and phrases. The sentence "pass for cause" has appeared quite frequently in the daily papers during the examination of jurors for the Haywood case, now being tried at Boise, Idaho, yet there are many people who do not understand the meaning of the terms used in the examination of jurors the law states some of the causes for which a man is incompetent to sit on a case and may be excused without a challenge, while on the other hand if the questions are answered in the negative he is passed for cause, which means that he is competent to sit as a juror on the case. The following are a few of the questions that are presented to the intended juror at Boise:

"Consanguinity or affinity within the fourth degree to either party. Standing in the relation of debtor or creditor, guardian or ward, master and servant, employer and clerk, or principal or agent to either party, being a member of the family of either party, or a partner, or united in business with either party, or surety on any bond or obligation for either party. Having an unqualified opinion or belief as to the merits of the action, or main question involved, founded upon knowledge or information of its material facts or some of them. The existence of a state of mind in the juror evincing enmity against or bias to or against either party."

After a jury of 12 men have been passed for cause the state and the defense have each ten peremptory challenges under the Idaho statutes, but after the peremptories are exhausted and the jury of 12 men secured, no more peremptory challenges are permitted and the case must be presented to the jury.
