THE GREATER EUGENE IN SIGHT

There is no reason why Eugene should not become a city twice its present size in the next two or three years, if the people now here will work to that end. Think what that would mean in increased business and property values! That this is entirely within the limits of possibility one may be convinced by reviewing the situation as it is today, and estimating the effect of enterprises that now seem assured upon the growth and business of the community. Briefly stated, the most important factors in this expected advance are the following:

The building of an electric railway, that will be extended without delay to Springfield, up the McKenzie river and if the plans of its promoters, who are conceded to have ample means do not miscarry, an extension to navigable water at Corvallis, and across the mountains to Prineville, making Eugene the jobbing center for the richest portion of Oregon.

The paving of the business streets is of importance scarcely secondary to that of electric road construction, since it will give an appearance of permanency and solidity to the city that will increase real estate values, attract investors and encourage improvement.

It is reasonably certain, too, that the Southern Pacific's so-called Naton branch will be extended across the mountains to Klamath Falls and Ontario, and that construction work will be commenced this year. This road forms its junction with the Southern Pacific main line close to the city limits of Eugene, and will add materially to the commercial importance of Eugene and Springfield, which are destined to grow into one city in the course of a few years, whether they always maintain distinct municipal governments or not.

The Story-Bracher millling plant which has about reached the point of actual construction, will give employment to several hundred men and make Eugene the centre of the greatest lumbering section in Oregon for years to come, added to great enterprises of the kind already in operation in Lane county at the present time.

The state university and other educational interests of Eugene are growing rapidly, and even if the referendum is invoked, though it does not seem probable now, that growth cannot be more than temporarily checked. One year from now the people by their votes will overwhelmingly endorse the appropriation and set the seal of their condemnation upon all attempts to hamper an institution that is the pride of all good citizens of Oregon.

Besides these larger enterprises we have improvements scheduled for this year that are important evidence of growth: a federal postoffice building, new general hospital and a large number of fine residences. Business blocks are also being planned and several will no doubt be built during the fall, as soon as the actual construction of the electric railway and street paving gives a guarantee of the coming era of growth.

No other city in Oregon, outside of Portland, is so advantageously situated for becoming a commercial centre, none other has the extensive a country, prolific of natural resources, to draw support from, and there is none more attractive in location for permanent homes. "The prettiest town in Oregon" is the universal verdict of every visitor, and its facilities in every branch of education are unexcelled on the Pacific coast.

There should be a real city here—a Greater Eugene—big, bustling and beautiful, in the next five years. Only a reasonable effort to advance common interests is necessary on the

part of our people, and the Guard believes that the situation is so well understood that every property owner and business man stands ready to do his part.

It seems about time to call a halt in the publication of detailed accounts of the business bluffs got away with early in the careers of successful business men. There are too many bluffers now trying to make good without encouraging others to enter the field. Give us a few of the bluffs that are called, which have been numerous in all careers.

This is the way the Salem Statesman looks at the situation: "This will be a great week in the history of Eugene, as the work of constructing its first electric railway will be inaugurated and the street paving will be commenced."

Railroad rebating is alleged to have been abolished, but political rebating is still doing business at most of the old stands, with no law to reach it, even if the prosecuting officials were willing.

According to several would-be weather prophets there'll be many a cold day during the coming summer. Well, it helps somewhat to know that Fairbanks can't be every where at once.

The St. Louis Times, an evening newspaper, received the following letter from one of its subscribers:
"I have read and I agree on most things, but upon one point I cannot convince him to my way of thinking. He says a morning newspaper is better than an evening one. I say emphatically the evening newspaper is the best. We take two papers and he carries his to the office with him after breakfast. I have only read half my copy of the Times when he comes to supper, but I notice that after our evening meal he sits down with his pipe and the Times and is busy with both until bedtime. Now, is the argument against him or is it not?"

To this the Times makes the following reply:
"The evening newspaper of quality is pre-eminently the paper for the home. It enters the household when the day's work, practically, is done. There then is leisure to enjoy it, time to digest it, opportunity to profit by it."

All the news of the world is there, fresh from the molding. It is the record of a living today, not of a dead yesterday. Its very conditions make it the reflection of the hour and snatch it from ponderosity. Though it may have dignity, it must ever be lightsome. Though it be chaste, it cannot find time to be tedious.

"The morning newspaper is like a teacher whose pupils have no time to hear the lesson he would impart. This is a busy world, we beg to assure E. K. M., and we fancy that if her husband would carry his favorite morning daily from the breakfast table to his office he sees little of it beyond the twenty minutes which is vouchsafed him on the street car, upon the back platform, possibly. Till evening he has no use for it further. The Times puts the case remarkably well. Eight times out of ten, however, the evening paper is the one that is thoroughly read from first page to last. When a morning reader has barely time to give passing attention to the headlines, ignoring the advertisements altogether, the merchant who has paid his money for space gets little in return.
