Portland Market Review.
Portland, May 30.—One city creamery, the T. S. Townsend Company, has declared war unintentionally on the other creameries of this city. The Townsend Company has advanced its quotations on butter to 24c for the best product. This is 1 1/2c over the price quoted by other local creameries. To make matters even more interesting the Townsend Company has added 1/2c to the price of cream. It is usually the rule for creameries to pay 1 1/2c a pound less for their butter fat than the highest price obtained for butter on the market. Today the Townsend company broke away from that unwritten law and is now offering within 1c a pound for butter fat of the highest price of butter. This concern is the only one today to announce the advance in price. Other creameries holding back to see what each other will do. Several of them say they propose to fight the advance.

Townsend Has Big Offer.
That there is a legitimate heavy demand for butter at higher prices quoted by all but one of the city creameries is attested to by T. S. Townsend of the creamery company. "We have received a bona fide offer," he says, for all our surplus butter at better than 24c a pound, and 24c offers are frequently received. This is what caused us to put up the price to 24c this morning. It's an out and out business proposition, with all sentiment detached. The others are talking of fighting the higher price, but we do not care, because we have already been offered more than this price for all the butter we can make. We want the cream and are going to pay for it."

Brief Notes of the Trade.
Egg market is sluggish, with receipts heavier. Some sales are made as low as 17 1/2c. Top of market 18c. Chickens are coming faster and the market is weaker, with a drop in price likely soon.

Strawberry market began the downward slide this morning, with more liberal receipts of ordinary grade. Fancy stock was rather scarce. Sales of Oregon as low as \$2.50 and as high as \$4.

Cantaloupes are down another \$1 a pony crate this morning.

Apples are coming faster and the market is lower. Better quality, too.

Apples are getting rather scarce, even cold storage stock being hard to obtain.

Lemon market is excited in the south, prices advancing 50 cents a case on fancy stock recently.
For strictly fancy potatoes \$2.25 is being asked along Front street today, with dealers not anxious to sell.

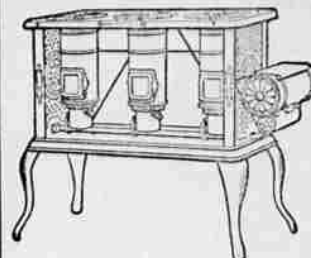
