UREN AND THE UNIVERSITY

W. S. U'ren, known as the father of the initiative and referendum law in Oregon, is in favor of an initiative measure granting the state university an appropriation of \$125,000 annually. He thinks this would carry and it would settle the school on a firmer basis than can ever be done by legislative action, since the objectors would have to subsidize for good if the people by decisive vote expressed themselves in favor of proper support for the university. In a recent newspaper interview Mr. U'ren is quoted as saying:

"I believe Attorney-General Crawford is right on the law of the case, and that the failure of the adherents of the referendum on the legislative appropriation to copy the title leaves the petition fatally defective. I believe the question ought to be settled by the vote of the people, and the sooner the better. As one of the friends of the university I would be very glad to assist in securing signatures for an initiative petition.

"The friends of the university would be glad to pay for circulating an initiative petition, and the people of Clackamas county, who are interested, would do their share. I am satisfied that the thing to do is to get the question before the people without further expense on behalf of the referendum, provided, of course, that the opponents of the appropriation do not take the matter into the courts."

BUILD ELECTRIC ROADS

Now that the Eugene-Corvallis canal scheme has been given up it is suggested by the Cottage Grove Nugget that attention should be turned to electric road building. The Nugget says:

"This does not necessarily mean there is no other means of attaining the same end as was desired by the digging of the canal, for as is suggested by the committee, and as has been spoken of by the Nugget, an electric line would be cheaper to build, cheaper to run and to answer every purpose for which the canal was intended.

"It would also open a greater opportunity of benefiting and interesting people in a far greater scope of country. Cottage Grove, for instance, would like better transportation and the question has been taken up by the Commercial Club of this place and requests have been made of the various commercial clubs in the valley to select delegates to meet at Cottage Grove in the near future to discuss the matter, and we would suggest that an electric line from Cottage Grove via Eugene and Albany to connect with the Corvallis line to Yachima be made a part of the discussion."

President Roosevelt keeps his friends as well as his enemies guessing. That speech at Indianapolis yesterday was about as good a defense of the stock market manipulators as it was written by one G. Cleveland in consideration of a salary of \$30,000 a year. The whole labor question revolves around the simple proposition whether the unions shall obey the law or whether they shall, by common consent or by act of government, be given a special license TO OVERRIDE THE LAW.

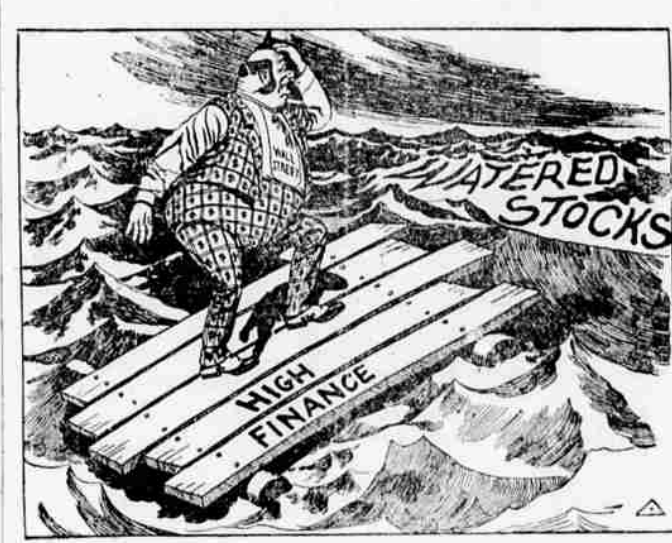
If the laws are wrong, then they should be changed—changed in an orderly AND CONSTITUTIONAL way, and not annulled or disregarded according to the caprice of PORTIONS of the people. This being granted, the natural inquiry is, What law is it that unionism commonly seeks to violate or abrogate? The answer to this query is that it is the law of INDIVIDUAL LIBERTY.

To think that in this country there are 2,000,000 organized men who seek the overthrow of the law of individual liberty, THE BASIC LAW OF THE REPUBLIC, is enough to shake one's confidence in the average good judgment of men.

But there is one saving grace about the situation, and that is that the great majority of the men belonging to the unions do not understand that unionism seeks its ends THROUGH THE DESTRUCTION OF LIBERTY. They would be the last to do anything consciously that would injure the liberties of the people, and they would be the first to offer their lives IN DEFENSE of those liberties.

Our government is founded on the open shop doctrine. WE declare that the LIBERTY OF THE INDIVIDUAL is paramount to the will of the state.
