

ILLNESS OF HAYWOOD DELAYS MURDER TRIAL

Boise, June 1.—The morning session of the Haywood trial was abandoned today owing to the illness of the prisoner who was attacked at an early hour by toxic poisoning. The doctors state his case is not serious, and it is believed he will be able to be in court this afternoon. The administration of opiates to relieve the intense pain left Haywood in a weak condition.

Following the announcement that Haywood was unable to attend court this afternoon an adjournment was had until Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

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BREWERS ARE EXPELLED FROM LABOR FEDERATIONS

Washington, June 1.—In the absence of President Gompers, Secretary Morrison, of the American Federation of Labor, today made public Gompers' announcement of the revocation of the charter of the International Union of Brewery Workers, because of its refusal to accept the terms proscribed by the Federation. This action will affect all the brewery workmen's unions throughout the country, comprising a membership of forty thousand.

The brewery employees have rebelled against President Gompers and the national labor executive council and they are to be disciplined. The method adopted is that of expulsion. The trouble has been growing for several years. Two months ago the national labor council met at Washington and gave the Brewery Workers' union until June 1 to comply with an order to oust all engineers, firemen and teamsters from its organization. These men were under the protection of the Brewery Men's

union, who took a vote, and 58 per cent of the membership favored resistance to the order, which brought about the present situation. The general opinion is that the workmen will contest the order and a long fight for reinstatement is anticipated, the brewerymen having about \$100,000 in the treasury.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCK FELT IN ECUADOR

Guayaquil, Ecuador, June 1.—Three earthquake shocks occurred at 3:20 this morning, and caused the inhabitants of this city to jump from their beds and crowd panic-stricken into the streets. The second shock was the heaviest, lasting forty seconds.

Owing to the construction of the buildings no damage was done in the city. There is no news from the interior.

COLONEL LEE SAYS SOUTH WAS AGAINST SLAVERY

Secession Was Threatened Many Times in North Before Action Was Taken By South Carolina to Leave Union of States - Speaker Refers to History

Richmond, Va., June 1.—In a speech at last night's session of the Confederate Union Colonel Robert E. Lee, Jr., declared that the great men of the South had always declared against slavery; that Virginia in 1778 and Georgia in 1798 passed acts prohibiting the importation of slaves; that secession was not preached the first time in the South, but was in the north threatened four times before South Carolina seceded.

First, by Timothy Pickens, of Massachusetts in opposing the acquisition of Louisiana; second, by Josiah Quincy, of Massachusetts, over the proposed admission of Louisiana as a state; third, by the Hartford convention over the dissatisfaction occasioned by the war with Great Britain; fourth, by the legislature of Massachusetts because it was proposed to annex Texas to the federal union.

STRIKE OF SEAMEN WILL CRIPPLE FRANCE

Paris, June 1.—The strike of officers, seamen and longshoremen at the ports of France is now complete every where in France, Algeria and Tunis. The strike does not affect foreign vessels, which are being unloaded without difficulty. Unless immediate settlement of the dispute, which had its origin in the protest against the unsatisfactory pensions for seamen, takes place, many industries will be compelled to shut down. The government finds it impossible with the means at hand to increase the pensions to the extent demanded by the laborers. The cabinet meets today to discuss the situation.

Mr. Edmundson is one of Eugene's brightest young lawyers, and if appointed will fill the office with credit. He is a graduate of the Ann Arbor law school and enjoys a good practice here.

NEW TARIFF TREATY WITH GERMANY

Washington, June 1.—President Roosevelt today issued a proclamation announcing the conclusion of the commercial treaty between the United States and Germany under the third section of the Dingley act. The proclamation is brief, simply announcing the list of articles upon which the United States grants reduced duties to Germany, and the undertaking of the German government to make reciprocity concessions.

MAY CONTEST RIGHTS OF HOMESTEADERS
