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SUMMARY OF OREGON TRACK TEAM WORK

Numerous Records Established During Season Just Closed - Dan Kelly Won 56 Points During Season - Moores and McKinney Tie for Second Place

The victory of Oregon over Washington and Idaho in the track meet at Seattle May 30 ended the season for the Oregon track team. The team this season has been far the best in the history of the university and even in the history of the Northwest. The team is heralded by various Northwest papers as being the strongest college team in the United States, and the records made conclusively prove that the Oregon track team could compete with and push very close any team in the land.

The Records Broken.
On May 17 in a meet with the Washington State College the Oregon team began its career of record-breaking. In the discus McKinney, the Baker City weight man, established a new Northwest record of 120 feet 8 1/2 inches. He also broke the record in the shot put for the Pacific coast, shoving out the 16-pound weight 45 feet 11 1/2 inches. Moores established a new Northwest record for the low hurdles on a curved track of 25 3-5 seconds. Hug also broke the state and Northwest records in the hammer throw on the same day when he threw it 146 feet 4 1-3 inches. In the 220-yard dash Kelly tied the world's record for a curved track in the time of 21 3-5 seconds.

At Corvallis a week later Zacharias

Zacharias broke Hug's record in the hammer by a magnificent cast of 150 feet 1 1/2 inches. Captain Moores at Corvallis also tied the world's record and established a new coast record in the low hurdles of 23 2-5 seconds on a curved track.

At the tri-state meet at Seattle on Thursday the track was in such condition that no record-breaking runs were made. McKinney tied the collegiate record in the United States and made a new Pacific coast record for the shot put of exactly 46 feet. Zacharias then also threw the hammer for a Northwest record of 155 feet 8 inches.

The Point Winners.
The way the point winners line up is drawn from the following tabulation: Each man who makes five points is entitled to the track "O"; the indoor meet at Columbia does not count in the points and so is omitted. In the three meets, Pullman, Corvallis and the tri-state at Seattle, against four teams, Oregon took 234 points out of a possible 366. The individual scores for the season are as follows:

NEW COMPANY TAKES OVER THE OREGON SECURITIES

West Coast Mines Incorporated This Week and Will Handle Well-Known Properties - Has Been Operating at Profit During Time of Receivership

Cottage Grove, June 1.—The West Coast Mines Company was incorporated under the laws of Oregon this week, the final papers having been filed on Tuesday last. The company takes over the property of the Oregon Securities Company of the Bohemia mining district. All the papers relative to the transfer of the mines and mills have been signed and they are now matters of record.

The capital stock of the new company is of the par value of \$1,500,000, divided in 1,500,000 shares. Four hundred thousand shares of this stock is preferred, 7 per cent non-cumulative stock, and 1,100,000 common. A cumulative stock is one where unpaid interest accumulates and becomes a debt against the company. A non-cumulative stock is a class where interest does not become a liability if not paid when due. Wherefore if the West Coast Mines Company has profits at the close of the year to pay the interest on the preferred stock, the owner gets his money; but if there is no profit or only part enough, the stockholder sustains the loss of interest and the mine is left free from debt on interest account.

Preferred Stock at 60 Cents. The 400,000 shares of preferred stock have been sold at 60 cents.

and 400,000 shares of common at 20 cents, thus realizing \$320,000. With this money the new company has paid all the debts owing by the Securities Company and the mine enters upon its new life with 700,000 shares of unsold stock in the treasury and free from debt. A part of this stock will be offered to the Securities stockholders at 20 cents, the price paid by the purchasers of the first block of 400,000 shares sold as above noted. The remainder of the 700,000 shares of treasury stock will be offered in the open market at a price greater than 20 cents. The entire proceeds realized from the sale of this block of 700,000 shares will be used for deep development at the mine and for treating base ores.

Operated at Profit.
During the past four months, while the mine was in the custody of the receiver, it has been operated at a profit, and the work this summer will be continuous. The energies of the new company will be directed to the deep development of the mine.
