Mrs. J. S. Porter, who has been visiting at the home of her brother, H. E. Morris, in Eugene, returned to Portland this afternoon.

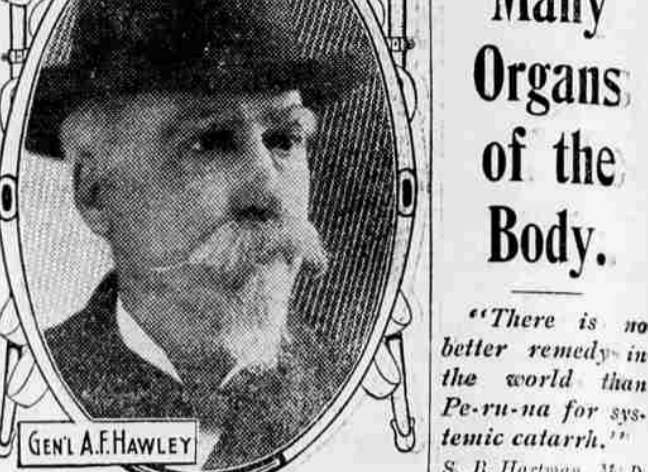
