SPRINKLING

CONTRACT LET BY COUNCIL

F. P. Close and A. S. Powers Have Begun Work at \$20 Per Block Per Month in Business District and \$8 Per Block in Residence District.

The city council yesterday let the contract for sprinkling the streets to F. P. Close and A. S. Powers, whose bid was \$20 per block per month for the business district and \$7 per block for the residence district. The only other bid was by S. B. McCuskey, of the Eugene Transfer Company, who bid \$22 per block in the business district and \$8 a month in the residence district.

Close and Powers have engaged the two sprinklers formerly used by the Eugene Transfer Company and have begun their work.

The districts being sprinkled under the new contract are as follows: No. 1—Williamette street from Sixth to Eleventh; No. 2—Williamette street from Eleventh to Fifteenth; Eleventh street from the alley west of Charnell to Alder; Pearl street, from the railroad to Twelfth; Eighth street, from Pearl to High; High street, from Seventh to Eleventh.

These are the streets embraced in the recent ordinance passed by the council. If the residents in other districts wish the streets sprinkled it will be necessary to get up petitions and have ordinances passed covering their districts.
