WATER CHARGE RUMORS FALSE

The farmers in the West have been greatly alarmed in the last few weeks by the persistent circulation of a report to the effect that the administration was preparing to make a charge for water derived from the national forests and used for irrigation and other general purposes. The report, it appears, has not the slightest basis of fact, and has been denied by officials of the forest service in a recently issued bulletin.

People of the sections of the West where irrigation has been such an important factor in development were naturally much concerned in the rumored charge for water coming from the national forests. The interests of people concerned with forestry and irrigation are much the same, as the steady flow of most of the irrigating streams is absolutely dependent on the preservation of the forest watersheds.

In a letter to Hon. Edward T. Taylor, of Glenwood Springs, Colo., concerning the rumored charge for water irrigation, Forester Pinchot says that he does not believe that there ever should be, or ever will be, a charge for water for irrigation. The erroneous report was founded on misrepresentations regarding the charges which electric power companies are required to pay for use and occupancy of lands in the national forests for reservoir sites, conduit right-of-way, and power stations. The charge is solely for the use of the lands, based on their value for such purposes, and is not in any sense a charge for water. The appropriation and use of water is regulated solely by the state and the forest service has no jurisdiction in the matter.

VIEWS OF PORTLAND PAPER

The People's Press, the organ of the Portland trade unionists, is especially proud of the work of the University of Oregon in the field of athletics. It says:

"That little old Oregon, with comparatively few students and with far from the best athletic equipment and resources should turn out a track team that stands higher than any other university team in the field this spring is more than remarkable. It is glorious. In the East they have discovered that an athletic reputation is worth more than laboratories and endowed scholarships so far as the advertising the school gets is concerned, and it is shrewd business judgment to make the most of the favorable athletic showing, especially when the showing is so remarkably good and has come through honest endeavor and not through the activity of purchased athletes; a form of activity that is by no means unknown in the big Eastern schools.

"The Oregon university today has the best track team in the United States and probably in the world. This is not vainglory nor theory; it can be demonstrated by the records and by the individual feats.

"Oregon could without question defeat any other field team in the country today, and Oregon should get that \$125,000 if for nothing more than her field day showing."

No time should be lost by the management of the Jimtown show in adopting the suggestion to have a John Smith day, and making the advertising appealing enough to get 'em all to the show, thus insuring its financial success. Of course, with several hundred thousand Johns on hand at one time there might be some mix-ups in the mail delivery and such, but these are minor matters.

SHIPPING NOTES OF FLORENCE PORT

Numerous Schooner Loads of Lumber Leave for San Francisco—T. M. Wolf Came Near Being Shattered.

The launch Lena is carrying the mail to Mapleton for a few days while the Hazel is laid up for repairs. The Washelore finished loading at Acme Wednesday and went down the river yesterday on her way to the sea.

The schooner Mayflower has loaded at the Oregon & California Lumber Company's mill, and was towed down the river yesterday.

The schooner Oakland finished loading Monday and left that night for San Francisco with a cargo of lumber from the Oregon & California Lumber Company's mill.

The schooner Sanolito finished loading at the Oregon & California Lumber Company's mill Tuesday and crossed out over the bar for San Francisco that night.

The ball game between Mapleton and Florence teams last Sunday resulted in a victory for the Mapleton boys. The score stood, Mapleton, 26; Florence, 10.

The schooner Hugh Hogan sailed for San Francisco last Thursday night after loading at the Oregon & California Lumber Company's mill.

The schooner Coquille was towed out to sea last Thursday night, with a cargo of lumber from the Saubert mill for the San Francisco market.

T. M. Wolfe came near being "shattered" a few days ago for a trip to San Francisco. It happened in this way: Mr. Wolfe left Florence on board the schooner Hugh Hogan, expecting that the vessel would stop at Coos Bay and he would go ashore there. On Friday a message was received here from the owners, ordering the schooner to come direct to San Francisco. That evening the steamer Roseau left for Coos Bay, overtaking the Hogan during the night and delivering the message. Mr. Wolfe was awakened from sleep and put into one of the lifeboats and taken to the Roseau in the darkness.
