CELEBRATION COMMITTEE'S FINAL PLANS

Judge L. T. Harris President of the Day and C. N. McArthur Orator - Drill By New Fire Engine and Team - Sports Under Direction Trainer Hayward

At a meeting of the Fourth of July committee last night final arrangements for the big event here on the nation's holiday were completed. From present indications the celebration will be the best ever held in Eugene. Numerous novel and new features are being secured and the people who celebrate here will not lack for amusement.

Judge L. T. Harris has been secured for president of the day and Attorney C. N. McArthur, of Portland, a graduate of the University of Oregon with the class of 1901, has promised to deliver the oration. John C. Veatch, member of the senior class of the university, will read the declaration of Independence. Professor Glas sand his quartet will have charge of the musical exercises in the forenoon. The exercises will be opened by the goddess of Liberty, accompanied by an escort from Company A and Company C.

Several bands will be engaged for the celebration thus insuring plenty of good music. Among the features of the day will be a drill by the new fire engine and the big black team, the pride of the city.
W. J. Hill, of the Barker Gun Works, will go to Portland at once to secure vaudeville attractions, also a ballonist and parachute jumper.
The committee has made arrangements with Trainer W. L. Hayward, of the university, to have charge of the sports, which means that some fine races and other contests will be pulled off. A good game of baseball will also be played during the day.
The fireworks will be set off from Skinner's butte, as usual, and not from College Hill, as reported. They will be handled by G. D. Linn, which means that they will be first-class in every particular. No pains will be spared to get the best.
There will be a grand free dance on the evening of that day.

FANS DRIVE SHINN OUT OF LEAGUE

Eugene Boy Made Five Errors in Sunday's Game—Fans Unjustly Hooted Him Till He Almost Collapsed From Nervousness.

Jimmy Shinn, the Beaver shortstop, has jumped the Portland team, says the Telegram. The experience of Sunday was too much for the boy wonder from Healdsburg, Cal., and he left yesterday for Eugene, Or., to visit with his parents before returning to California.
Shinn made five errors Sunday. Three of them were raw ones, and two of them could easily have been excused because they were hard ones. The crowd went after the boy, however, and never let up on him either in the field, on the bench or at the bat. The result was that Shinn could not do anything, and by the time the game was over he was in a state of nervous collapse. He announced at once that he would quit, but it was not taken seriously until he left yesterday.
The fans are responsible for driving him out of town, and although he says he has quit professional ball for good, he is too promising a player to be dropped. If he ever does come back into the fold with a team against Portland, the fans will see what they have missed.
Including his five errors Sunday

Shinn made 24 while with the team. His fielding average is .877 and his batting average is .125. Although this batting average is almost out of sight, Shinn has been one of the best run-getters on the team. He has 24 to his credit.
Shinn has worked hard and conscientiously, but the pace of the league is too fast for him to play regularly.

HARLAN SAYS BIBLE NOT INFALLIBLE

Washington, June 4.—That a belief in the inspiration of the Bible is not the foundation, or even a part of the foundation of it, was the assertion made by the Rev. Richard Harlan, formerly president of the Lake Forest, Ill., college, and son of Associate Justice Harlan, of the Supreme court of the United States, in his baccalaureate sermon Sunday before the graduates of George Washington University.
"The Bible," he said, is not infallible; it is only infallible to reveal Christ to the world."
He called the "take-this-or-nothing" method of teaching Christianity as the "brigandage method."
The speaker declared that it is not necessary to take the Bible as an unerring guide when it comes to some of the questions of geology, history or even of ethics.

YOUNG MAN'S LEFT ARM IS SAWED OFF

Harry Hanson, aged 17 years, was the victim of a serious accident at the Southern Pacific Company's saw-mill No. 3 at Marcola yesterday afternoon between 4 and 5 o'clock. He was working about a saw while it was not in motion, and it suddenly started up without any warning being given, with the result that the boy's left arm was sawed off near the shoulder and the scapula sawed in two. He was at once started for Eugene, the company surgeon there binding up the wound as well as possible, however, before he left. He arrived in town between 8 and 9 o'clock last night and was taken to the Eugene hospital, where Dr. Palne, assisted by Dr. Kuykendall, dressed the wound. He is getting along very well today, although he is still very weak from the shock.
