SEVERE QUAKE FRIGHTENS 'FRISCO

San Francisco, June 4.—At 12:26 this morning San Francisco and the cities about the bay were shaken by a severe earthquake. The shock was the severest since the disastrous tremor of April, 1906. The shock

was not violent enough to sever electrical connections and although the entire fire department was placed in readiness to fight any fires that might follow, there was no blaze of any consequence. As far as can be learned at this hour the damage was limited to the breaking of dishes on the shelves and the destruction of a few tottering walls in the burned district. In the residence district a number of people ran into the streets in their night clothes. Along Golden Gate avenue a genuine panic prevailed. Several hundred women rushed to the street in their night clothes. Three women were treated for nervous shock, but no one suffered injury, so far as reported.

SENATOR F. W. MULKEY SPEAKS AT ASSEMBLY

Graduate of University With Class of 1896, Now Successful In World's Affairs, Tells of His Days at His Alma Mater - Seniors In Caps and Gowns

Ex-United States Senator Frederick W. Mulkey spoke this morning at the university on his "Memories of the University." About 500 people listened to the address, which was full of interest at all times and in periods bordered on poetical eloquence. When in the university—the senator graduated in 1896—he was an orator of considerable ability, but this morning he showed the professors of the institution how vastly he had improved.

The senator took up first the present trouble with the referendum, and said that all that the university needed to pull it through was loyalty. The referendum was followed by memories of his college days, in which he recalled his troubles in Greek and Latin. In dealing with the subject he gave hope to those who are failures in the dead languages. "If you fail in Greek and Latin there are places in the world I have found which do not demand them, and there are some hope for you, as there was for me."

Mr. Mulkey, also told why he would attend a Western college, and Oregon in particular, rather than a great Eastern school. He said that Oregon held in his heart a place as sacred as that devoted to his father and mother.

Seniors in Caps and Gowns.
One of the features of the morning was the appearance of the Seniors in full dress of cap and gown. Senator Mulkey's class was the first to inaugurate the custom. At that time a vigorous battle raged in the Senior class, a considerable portion of which did not care to wear the honored Senior dress. Senator Mulkey is said to have cut a very fine figure then, as he does now.

BURNS TO DEATH IN TRANSFORMER

Helena, Mont., June 4.—Detecting the odor of burning flesh three-quarters of an hour after Charles Bothwell, of Niagara Falls, New York, a transformer expert for the Westinghouse Company, had gone inside of a transformer at the power plant of the Helena Power Transmission Company at Lake Hauser, the tender made an investigation and found Bothwell unconscious. He was taken out and died a few minutes later. He had come in contact with the lightning circuit of the plant. His home was at Niagara Falls, New York. He was sent out a year ago by the Westinghouse people to supervise the installation of machinery at the new plant, the second largest in the world. He was 29 years old and unmarried. An uncle is said to be a prominent member of the Westinghouse firm. The Odd Fellows lodge of Niagara Falls, to which he belonged, has been notified of his death.

ORCHARD TELLS STORY OF STUENENBURG MURDER

(Continued from Page 1.)

this point in Orchard's story, which will be resumed in the morning.

Hawley's Hard Thrusts.
Boise, Idaho, June 4.—In his plain, blunt manner J. H. Hawley this morning held the close attention of a large crowd in the court room while he outlined the case of the state against W. D. Haywood. The auditor who paid the closest attention was the defendant himself. He was under a great strain most of the time. Though he kept his eyes fastened upon the attorney who was setting forth the terrible catalogue of crimes laid at the door of the "inner circle" of the Western Federation of Miners, he fidgeted much, shifting his position in his chair, but seldom glancing away from the speaker. When his eyes changed their direction it was to glance along the double line of faces in the jury box, as though searching there for some evidence of the effect of the recital upon the men who are to determine his fate. It was plainly a terrible ordeal for the accused man, and it is stated that some of Mr. Haywood's interruptions were for the purpose of giving his client a breathing spell, a few moments during which he might relax and nerve himself for the continuation of the story.

Mr. Hawley is not an orator, but in his statement he made many thrusts that cut deeply and caused the man at the bar of the court to wince as though in pain.

Makes Haywood Blanche.
"The inner circle of the Western Federation of Miners," he said, "stained in human blood," and the face of the prisoner blanched as the words fell from the lips of the prosecutor.

Again came this indictment: "The inner circle brought around them a few choice spirits, and to them murder and assassination became a trade and means of livelihood," and the arraignment seemed to reach the vitals of the defendant.

A feature of the statement made by the prosecutor was that he differentiated between the inner circle of the federation and the mass of the membership. He made it very clear that the state does not charge the rank and file of the membership with being murderers, but set forth with care the claim that the inner circle, getting into power, was prepared to retain it through lawless means. It built up a force that could not be set aside by the masses of the members, establishing a political control and domination in many sections in a manner that made it supreme.

Darrow's Statement.
Boise, Idaho, June 5.—Clarence Darrow, of counsel for the defense, gave out this statement regarding the jury empaneled to try Haywood today: "The jury is made up of eight Republicans, three Democrats and one prohibitionist. There is no man on the jury who works for wages or who has ever belonged to a labor organization, except Burns, who was a member of the carpenter's union 14 years ago."

"The jurors appear to be men of honest purposes, determined to give the defense a fair trial. But they belong to a class to which none of the defendants ever belonged and they have no natural kinship with labor organizations."

"They are drawn from a county almost wholly agricultural and each juror has for a year and a half seen little about the case except things published in the Boise daily papers and these papers have been uniformly hostile to the defendants. Nearly all the jurors have admitted that they are prejudiced against the defendants and are equally hostile to the defense because they were based upon the statements of hostile publications."

Mr. Walker informed a reporter today that they are still making good progress with the work, having reached Lower Leaburg. They started at Blue River and are working this way. They report that the settlers along the McKenzie are all anxious to see the line built and are willing to give the right-of-way without hesitation.

OREGON NEWS NOTES

The record sale of Rogue River valley orchard property was made last week, when the beautiful E. J. Bellart orchard near Medford was purchased by C. E. Marshall, of Rensselaire, Ind., for \$33,000. It comprises only 26 acres.

The wool sales at Heppner yesterday were a success as to prices, and both buyer and seller seem to be satisfied. About 20 buyers were present, the total sales being 563,000 pounds. The highest price paid was 20 cents, and the lowest 17 1-2 cents.

Oregon prunegrowers and packers have an important interest in the movement originating in California to compel the railroads to put into force a new schedule of freight rates for prunes in boxes or in bags. The controversy has been taken before the interstate commerce commission and whatever conclusion may be reached will affect Oregon as well as California. The movement originated with coast growers and Eastern packers. It is opposed by coast packers.
